#### THE HIMMELEIN HOUSE

Visitors to Kelley's Island often ask of the origin and history of the large place on the south shore known as the Himmelein Hotel.

Mr. and Mrs. John Himmelein, parents of the John Himmeleins who reside at Cricket Lodge, first came to Kelley's Island in 1859. They resided temporarily above what is now the corner store, then the only village store. The next year they purchased the only available property on South Shore Drive, the site of the present Himmelein house. The house was first built in 1860. Two wings were added in 1874 and the third floor was added in 1882.

It was used as a hotel until about 1915, and was known all over Ohio as a summer resort. People from Cincinnati, Columbus, and points so far south as Texas, were regular visitors here. They would bring their families in June and stay until school started.

Dances, masquerades, and lawn parties were some of the affairs held there. In the spring and autumn the Hotel was open for the fishing season, but only the family resided there in the winter.

There were six children in the Himmelein family. Jennie, the eldest girl, met Mr. F. W. Cook of Evansville, Indiana, here and married him. Their oldest son is now Rear Admiral Cook, Chief of the Bureau of Aeronautics in Washington, D.C. They spent summers here for many years.

After Mrs. John Himmelein died in 1909, the Hotel was run first by their son John, then Richard. After 1915, it was divided into separate apartments to be used as summer residences by the immediate family.

# -CHURCH HISTORY

Once there were eight different denominational churches on Kelley's Island. One of the first ones, built in 1863, was the Catholic church, which is now the home of Mr. and Mrs. Hugo Seeholzer.

Some of the Kelley family conducted services, for the Episcopalian faith. Also in 1863, a union Sunday School was organized for the Protestant people. Mr. M. K. Holbrook was the superintendent for five years. He was then ordained as a minister of the Congregational Church. This church building used to stand between Sam's Auto shop and Joe Matso's home.

The German Reform Congregation was the next church to be organized in 1865. This edifice still stands on Division Street across from the pond.

Then in 1866, the Evangelical church was started. This denomination supplies the pastors for the only Protestant church on the Island.

In 1925 there were three churches: Catholic, German Reform, and the Union Independent. At present there are just two, Catholic and the Community Church. The German Reform Church doesn't conduct services any more, but the Ladies Aid Society of this denomination still hold their meetings.
