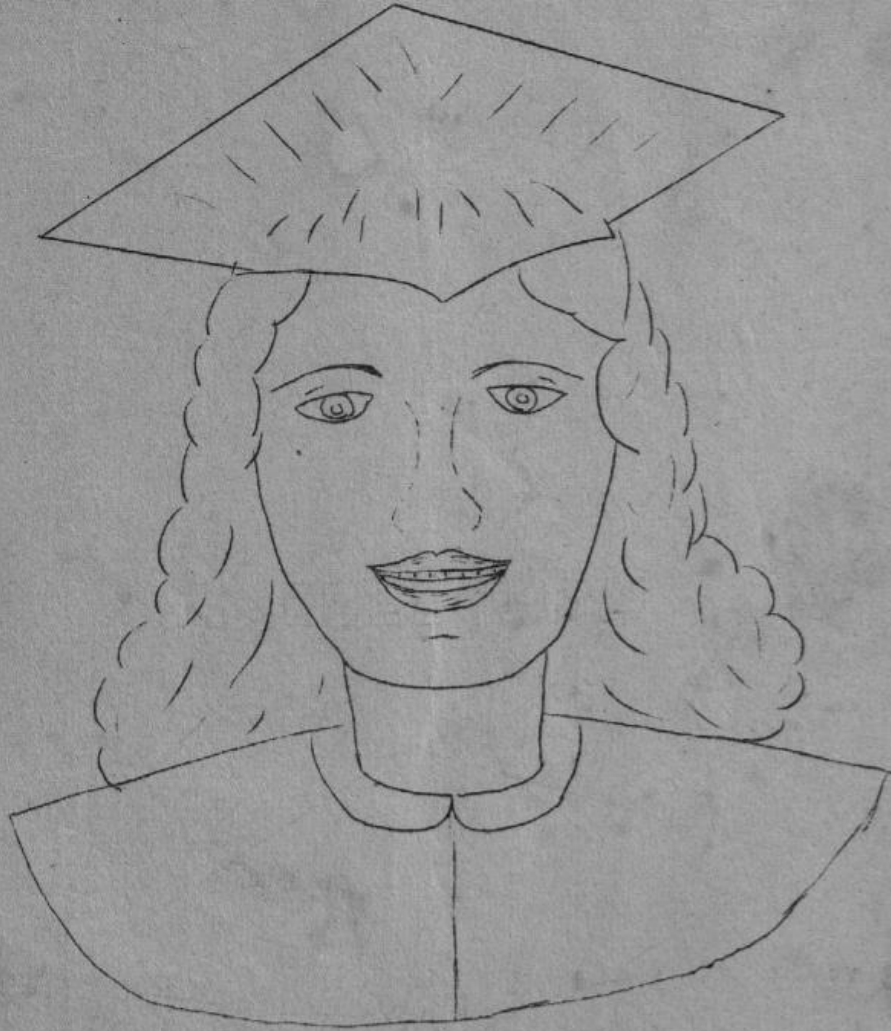

In many places, May Day is observed by festivals and dances. Memorial Day, May 30, is observed in most of the states. The second Sunday in May is Mother's Day.

Memorial Day is a legal holiday sacred to the memory of

those who died in the service of their country. The graves of the war dead are decorated with flowers. Originally Memorial Day was set aside to honor men who died in the war between the States. In 1868, General John A. Logan, commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, named May 30 as a special day for the honoring of servicemen.

Mother's Day is a day set aside every year in honor of motherhood. Anna Jarvis of Philadelphia first suggested Mother's Day in 1907, but it was not until 1914 that it received National recognition through a resolution passed by both houses of Congress.

One of the customs of this day is to wear a carnation—a colored carnation if the mother is living and a white one if the mother is dead.
