Ed Kuchar has selected Simonson Construction Company as the builder mainly because Bob Simonson shares the same demands as Ed regarding high quality and workmanship for this project. Bob agrees this is a winwin for all Island residents. Ed comments he has seen enough party tents around the Island for various events or chairs lined up along beaches in ninety plus degree weather. It is time we give the Island an event hall commensurate with our modern day needs, plus the Parish can use rental income to offset operating expenses.

The gathering hall will be built with all current state of the art features and materials.

July 23 Statement from the Mayor

Yesterday, Governor Mike DeWine enacted a state-wide order indicating that mask wearing is now mandatory in public

spaces . The order goes into effect tonight, July 23, at 6pm. What does that mean for Kelleys Island?

• All individuals on Kelleys Island must wear facial coverings in public at all times when:

- At an outdoor location that isn't a residence
- Outdoors, but maintaining 6 feet of distance isn't possible
- from people who are not part of your household
- Waiting for, riding, driving, or operating public
- transportation, such as a taxi, a car service, or a private car used for ride-sharing
- You are over 10 years old

• There are individuals and situations that are exempt from maskwearing. They are as follows:

- Those with a medical condition or a disability or those communicating with someone with a disability
- Those who are actively exercising or playing sports
- Those who are officiants at religious services
- Those who are actively involved in public safety
- Those who are actively eating or drinking

YES, wear a mask!

Waiting in line to get your golf cart or bike rental or returning your golf cart or bike rental.

Walking through busy downtown KI where lots of people are present; using public restrooms.

Waiting to get a table using the restroom at your favorite KI restaurant, or picking up a takeout order at your favorite KI restaurant.

Shopping at your favorite KI boutique or store.

Waiting for and riding the Kelleys Island Ferry as a walk-on passenger; being a passenger on a hired fishing charter.

Riding as a passenger in an island taxi service.

Sitting at the beach if you are unable to be socially distant from others.

NO, you don't need to wear a mask!

Riding around in your golf cart on our village streets or at your property.

Walking on a quiet street or nature preserve where there aren't many people.

To name a few: 2 x 6 exterior walls with lifetime siding, super foam insulation, LED lighting, water saving fixtures, best quality HVAC system, a new larger sanitary system, etc. etc.

Another very important contribution toward this project is the Palladino family which has stepped forward and insisted they absorb the freight costs of bringing equipment, materials and construction people to the Island plus the use of their people and equipment.

If all goes well with the permits and material deliveries, we hope to have construction completed before years end. Ed Kuchar wants to personally thank all those involved who are helping and will help in the future. Ed Kuchar



What is that big building at the State Park?

This is one of the TOP 10 questions that we get asked at the history museum and on Facebook.

That was the North Side quarry crusher. Late in 2018, the State Park cleared the trees and brush from around this structure, revealing it for the first time in many years. As a result, people are asking "What is that big cement thing at the State Park?"

While there are several great pictures in the quarry section of the museum that tell a more detailed story about this structure and the various quarry operations on the Island, here is a little history about this particular building.

this particular building. The right side of the building was the steam plant that powered the entire operation. The left side was the crusher building and stone storage bins.

Railroad cars would back up through a hole in the upper part of the building and tip stone down into the crusher, which was located in the corner where the two structures meet. You can still see the concrete pads from the trestle in the grass. Conveyor belts would carry the crushed stone across the top of the concrete structure and dump it into the bins. RR cars backed up underneath (in the 'tunnel') where the stone would drop into the cars. The train would carry the stone cars out onto the dock and dump it into the bins on the dock. These were called pocket docks. There were chutes that would be lowered to allow the stone to tumble onto the boats. If the stone should get stuck in the chutes, they would send quarry worker in with a sledgehammer or a small charge of

black powder or dynamite to dislodge the blockage. It was very dangerous work.





Geocaching – A Great Outdoor Activity

Geocaching is a great way to get outside and stay active while maintaining social distancing. Geocaching is a hobby that uses multimillion dollar satellites to find Tupperware hidden in the woods. Most people take the GPS (Global Positioning Satellites) systems in phones, cars, and computers for granted. A single satellite can cost \$10,000,000 - \$400,000,000 to launch into space. There are about 3,000 man-made objects in orbit including 31 active GPS satellites (out of 74 launched since 1978) along with 9 reserve, 2 test, 30 retired, and 2 satellites lost at launch.

It takes 3 satellites to Trilaterate a location in 2 dimensions and at least 4 to Trilaterate a location in 3 dimensions using Latitude (lines parallel to the equator called parallels and Longitude, lines perpendicular to parallels called Meridians) {This system has been used since 300 BC.}

There are several common types of Caches and Sizes. A Traditional or large geocache usually is an Ammo Box or Tupperware container that can hold a notebook for geocachers to log the FIND. There may be room in the container for trading items, Travel Bugs, and other small objects. When you become a member you choose a unique name that identifies you- no two users can have the same geocache name. You use this name to log finds or as an "owner" to hide and publish a cache. Caches also have a unique name so there is no confusion on logging finds.

A small cache might be a peanut butter jar or container that can be water proofed about that size.

A micro cache is the size of a Hide a Key Box or smaller- some geocachers have very inventive ways to make

very very small caches and even smaller log books. This requires a Bring Your Own Pen warning so you can write on the log.

A Nano cache can be a very small threaded metal tube with a screw off cap.

You find cache locations at: Geocaching.com after becoming a member and searching via the internet at any location you may travel to around the world. There are about 300,000 caches worldwide.

Multi-caches have at least three sets of Lat/Longs to find the cache. There are stages with the next set of Lat/Longs to find the final stage/ cache.

Earth Caches and Virtual Caches have no cache, instead there is a natural structure such as a waterfall, mountain, natural rock formation at the location and Virtual Caches have a man-made structure similar to an Earth Cache that the finder photographs and e-mails to get credit for the find.

Travel Bugs are small objects attached to a Dog Tag from Geocaching. com with a set of instructions related to the name of the Travel Bug. If you find a travel bug and you choose to move it you follow the directions on the bug and take it to another cache. I found one named Rubber Ducky. It was a little rubber duck about 1 inch long, its directions were to take Rubber Ducky to any other cache near a body of water. From there Rubber Ducky could move from one body of water to another. You can follow a Travel Bug on its journey around the world via the internet. I found it in Ohio and put it in a cache in Key Largo and watched it as it traveled to the north along the Atlantic coast.

There is a rule in caching. Cache in Trash out. If you find trash while caching, remove it properly. Leave a location as clean or cleaner than you found it!

Non-geocachers are known as Muggles and geocachers try to hide their activities from Muggles since

they may think you are a terrorist or watching a place to commit a crime and call the police. Acting nonchalant, calm, and relaxed helps muggles from being afraid, bothering local officials and wasting their time.


Geocachers hide objects and publish the Lat/Longs for other Geocachers to find the caches and log their finds. Geocaching.com has Rules and Guidelines for hiding and allowing a cache to be published.

When you go to hide a geocache, think of the reason you are bringing people to that spot. If the only reason you are bringing people to that spot is the cache, then find a better spot.

Some rules/guidelines on ĥiding a geocache include:

Obey Local Laws, Get Permission, Choose the location wisely, check that caches or "Stages" multi-caches, for any other geocache at least .1 mile away.

The location should be for the long term, available most days (days - not always after sun down), no contact with the owner required, do not bury a cache or require tools to open, DO NOT HARM PLANTS, ANIMALS, OR THE ENVIRONMENT, stay away from any restricted area such as archaeological or historic sites, bridges, railroads, dams, military installations, hospitals, airports, or major roadways. Geocachers - with permission may place caches in space, either on other planets or in spacecraft......still waiting the first Space Cache.

Kelleys Island Audubon News and Fall Migration Information

Spring migration arrives with excitement - flocks of migrating birds, erupting flowers, bursting tree buds, return of the "snowbirds" and the air filled with birdsong and that fresh smell of spring. Remember the excitement of every May when the first rose-breasted grosbeak arrived at your feeder, the red-headed woodpeckers and the Baltimore orioles, chickadees' happy song, spotting a scarlet tanager in a tree or an indigo bunting in your driveway. Warblers of rainbow colors don't stop at seed feeders, but they are busy in the trees, among the fresh new leaves, gleaning for bugs. Even the red-wing blackbirds, grackles and starlings announce Spring!

In contrast, fall migration moves slowly, quietly, steadily and is almost imperceptible. The bright mating colors have faded to dull, the songs are silenced (ala Simon and Garfunkel). Feeders still carry the leftover seeds of spring while annual flowers color our yards. Fall migration actually begins before the spring migration is over, as the earliest migrators such as shorebirds, have already concluded mating, fledging young and begun their return trip south. And among the treetops the warblers stop to eat bugs on their major trip to South America.

If your feeders have been hanging empty because you got tired of feeding just grackles and starlings, now is the time to wash out the old seed crumbs and prepare to feed the migrators. As Kelleys Island is a stopover for the north-bound, so it is for the south

bound birds. They need to build up their fat supply for energy to make that long trip. All types of sunflower seeds have high fat content and are eaten by most birds. Unsalted peanuts in the shells or cracked nuts are preferred by woodpeckers and blue jays. Nijer seeds are finch favorites, but they seem to prefer then in seed socks rather than feeders. After a good watering of your garden, watch the robins find the worms. Hummingbirds, now double or triple their spring population, need fresh sugar-water

nectar, changed just about every day when it is very hot. We don't want our beloved hummers getting drunk or sick on fermented sugar water! And leave your hummingbird feeders out until 3 weeks after you have seen the last one visit your station. The end of summer is a good time to find a sale on bird feeding equipment. Pick-up a new bird house or a new design of feeder, and you are already planning for spring. Meanwhile, watch for the migrating Monarch butterflies in September.

The Kelleys Island Audubon Club continues to host nature walks on the third Thursday of the month, in lieu of our usual educational meetings. Meet at the school parking lot at 7 pm to head off to one of the many natural areas on the island. If you head out to North Pond, climb up to the top of the platform to see if you can find the beaver lodge just northwest of the platform. The beaver living there was spotted often during the early summer. Stay safe and healthy and enjoy the beautiful autumn on Kelleys Island.



Life Jackets Save Lives

It is important to choose a life jacket that you will wear, that meets the needs of your boating activity, and that works for the boating environment it will be exposed to.

Knowing the facts about the different types of life jackets (also referred to as PFDs -- Personal Flotation Devices) can help you decide which is appropriate for you. ODNR strongly encourages all boaters to wear life jackets, whether or not the law requires it.

Life jackets must be:

• Coast Guard approved, in good and serviceable condition, and the appropriate size for the intended user.

• There should be a wearable life jacket (that fits!) for every person onboard the boat. The type and size of your boat determines if a throwable PFD is required.

Ohio law REQUIRES life jackets to be worn:

while riding a personal watercraft (PWC or jet ski).
while waterskiing or being

• while waterskiing or being towed on a similar device.

• by children less than 10 years of age on any vessel less than 18 feet in length.

It is particularly important to WEAR a life jacket:

• when the boater cannot swim or is a weak swimmer.

- when boating alone.
- when the water is dangerously cold (the months of October through

May in Ohio). • during rough water/waves and

- severe weather conditions.
 - when boating at night.
 - in emergency situations.
 - in swift and fast current.

Take Your Dog Boating

It's getting more common to see "Fido" on board with the family. A recent survey of boat owners in the U.S. showed that 70% of them own dogs. Not sure if your dog and your boat are a good fit? In general, a dog that is accustomed to noise, comfortable around water, well behaved, and listens to "down" and "stay" commands can make a fine boating companion. Excitable or skittish dogs may not be the best boating pals.

The first priority of a responsible dog owner should be the safety and well being of their dog. To keep your dog safe, you need to know your pet: Does he like water? Is he afraid of noise? Does he listen to you? Some dogs just don't like water and some dogs don't like to swim. If you don't know how your dog will react near water or boats, you should find out before you actually plan a trip. Visit a boat dock or launch area and see how your dog reacts to the surroundings.

As a boat operator, you are also responsible for the safety and wellbeing of your human passengers. Will your dog being onboard be a distraction to you? If your dog needs continual attention from you, or if any of your passengers are not comfortable with your dog, you should reconsider taking the dog onboard.

Ensure your dog exhibits proper behavior at all times while on a boat. That means staying in one place, which is especially important on smaller boats,, no distractive barking, etc. Be sure your pet knows where she belongs in the boat and stays there while the vessel is in motion.

If you've never had

your dog on the boat, practice a "dry run" – where your boat is loaded with everything else you take on an outing. Be sure you have all the equipment on board you usually would and that it is stowed where you normally put it. Put the dog on board and determine where the safest and most comfortable place is for your pet.

Some safety professionals suggest counting your dog as a person in the boat because they can require space (taking up a seat) and can move on their own inside the boat. Definitely include their weight when calculating your boat capacity.

Make sure that you have a plan for when your dog goes overboard, whether that is voluntarily or not. If your dog is a swimmer, be sure you have practiced getting your dog back into the boat, whether you are in the water with him/her or not. Many pet flotation devices have a gripping handle incorporated into the design, which can be very helpful. And just as you plan for food, drink, and restroom stops, for yourself and your passengers, make sure you are prepared for your dog. Have a water bowl and snacks for your dog, and bring her leash and bags for waste cleanup. You never know when a treat can come in handy, or when you will need a plastic bag.

PFDs for Dogs

Buying a flotation device for a dog is a lot like buying one for a human: The main concern should be getting a device that properly fits your dog.

Make sure the flotation device has the characteristics your dog needs, like added warmth from neoprene if water temperature requires it. A gripping handle for lifting the dog back into the boat. Make sure you know the weight limits of the device.

You should consider taking your dog with you to the store so you can fit the device before buying, but be sure to call ahead to make sure that's okay.

A general internet search of "dog PFD" will locate a slew of options when it comes to flotation devices for your dog, BoatUS has some good information on testing different dog flotation devices. Regardless of type, all life jackets must meet these U.S. Coast Guard requirements: • Life jackets must have a "U.S.

Coast Guard Approved" label with approval number listed.

• Boats less than 16 feet in length (including canoes and kayaks of any length) must be equipped with wearable PFDs for each person on board.

• Each PFD must be the appropriate size for the person who wears it. Size, weight ranges, and recommended uses are listed on the label.

• All straps, buckles, zippers and stitching on a life jacket must be intact and the fabric should be in good condition.

• Life jackets must be readily accessible to occupants of a boat. They should NOT be stored in sealed packages or in a locked or closed storage area.
