



Finally, as you head into the





History Museum News

By the time you read this, the museum will be closed for the season. However, we do have a special 2-day open house November 19-20 for holiday shopping.

This was quite the year with so many changes. A new gift shop direction featured more nature items and Kelleys Island books, jewelry, and Island themed items. We even had Jordan Killam tell a spooky story in the church on the kid's Halloween day. We started work on the church doors, repaired the steeple, and cut down a tree on the empty lot and removed those pesky pricker bushes which we could never control without drawing blood. As we approach the new year, we take stock of what we have accomplished and move forward on some much-needed projects. We had to table a couple of large projects (migrating our website to a new platform, building a new

storage building, and installing new windows in the parsonage house, repairing the bake oven) but hope to move forward on them this winter for spring completion. We post almost daily on our Facebook page and our recent BLOG include articles about Checkers (1869), Baseball (the old rules and how it was played on the Island in the 1860s), and a little history about our 'new' museum building.

As people clean out their houses, we are getting some remarkable items for our collection. Our thanks (yet again) to Jim Selfe who brought us a rare, well used, Steiff Bear. These were introduced to the American market in 1903 and this one was purchased in 1904 for Jim's uncle Lester Selfe. It was well used by the children in his family for years. This is likely a Bear 55 PB, the world's first toy bear with jointed arms and legs. The fur was mohair plush (mostly gone now). The feet have five embroidered toes. This changed to four toes in 1906. The joints are the disc type, and you can feel the round disks under the fur. Shortly after the purchase, Steiff began adding the famous button in the ear. The bear is how held together with safety pins and has been repaired many times over the years. Jim's grandmother made the sweater. How amazing that this little bear survived over 115 years, and so many childhoods only to find its way into our museum.



Base Ball Fever - 1869

The first reference to baseball on Kelley's Island appeared in 1869. Islanders embraced this new sport with enthusiasm. "We learn that a base ball club has been organized on the Island. Of whom composed we have not been informed. At present the zeal manifested by the baseballists is intense. It engages the attention of old and young and every other consideration is swallowed up in the interest and excitement it has created. At any time when the game is in progress, the old and decrepit may be seen vying with the youthful and the strong with energy and earnestness. How long the excitement will last we are unable to say but presume that when the busy season returns this popular amusement will be abandoned for the more useful pursuits of business.'



The Island Base Ball team c1910


Commonly played in the summer, in the early days, Island baseball was played in the late fall or early spring. There wasn't time in the summer because of quarrying, grape growing, and working in general. March 9, 1871 - "Sunday – Wind west and a

very little snow on the ground in the morning which didn't look very propitious for playing ball. The sun came out however and melted most of the snow off and the great ball match between the First Nine of the High School and the Butter Fingers came off in the afternoon according to agreement. The Butter Fingers getting the choice opposition took the field. Everything went off lovely for the Laurels; they whitewashed their opponents promptly. In the 4th inning, Hettrick struck a hot fly to pitcher who received it handsomely on his stomach and retired. There were several very handsome flies caught on both sides and the Butter Fingers did some as pretty muffing as one could wish. The result was: Laurels 4/4 doz. to Butter Fingers 9. Hurrah for the Butter Fingers and long may they wave.

Tuesday – More Base Ball. Lecture in the evening by Rev. M. K. Holbrook, second of the series. Wednesday – More Base Ball. Thursday – Some Base Ball again. Jno. Rinehamer started for Sandusky with his pound boat but had to come back on account of the stiff head wind. Third and last of Mr. Holbrook's series of lectures, all of

which were exceedingly

interesting. Saturday – In the afternoon the Cock of the Walks and Little Rocks joined their forces and played the scrub Nine a game of Base Ball which resulted in a complete victory for the allied army. Score stood 32 to 9. The Scrubs whitewashed their opponents twice and only got served to that dish once. Give credit where credit is due. The 9th annual Kelleys Island Owl Festival is scheduled for the weekend of November 5-7th. Activities will start at 7:00 a.m. on Friday morning at the Cleveland Museum of Natural History's Jones Preserve with songbird banding until noon time. Owl banding will begin about half-hour after sunset at the Cleveland Museum of Natural History's Scheele Preserve and continue until we get tired. There will be a campfire at the North Pond State Nature Preserve parking lot from sunset until banding stops for the evening. State Park Manager, Chris Ashley will maintain the fire and monitor the North Pond trail owl nets. All owls will be processed at the Scheele Preserve but

released at their capture location. All activities are open to the public free of charge, but donations are accepted.

Why Geriatric Medicine Needs to **Become Mainstream**

pediatrics, Like geriatric medicine is also a specialized field practice. The difference is that pediatrics has achieved mainstream acceptance and geriatrics has not.

I interviewed Dr. Ardeshir Hashmi, Clinic Cleveland Endowed Chair for Geriatric Innovation and Section Chief Center for Geriatric Medicine. He pointed out that pediatrics, as a field of medicine, was born after

adult medicine. As a result, more children began living into adulthood and life expectancy increased.



This occurs when doctors are not trained to be aware of the possibility of alternative ways to effectively treat older patients.' The use of presumption, Hashmi explains, is when it is presumed that the older person can be treated in the same manner that a 20- or 30-year-old would be treated for the same condition.

Dismissiveness is when the condition is seen as being "normal for your age" and the patient is led to believe that there is nothing more that can be done to improve the patient's quality of life or functional health.

As an older adult who desires to maintain my health and functional independence, it is clear that this will only occur when geriatric medicine becomes mainstreamed medicine. That means the health care system needs to be redesigned so it incorporates using the advice of geriatricians "consultative geriatricians."

In November 2021, I will have mv first "Successful Aging Visit" also called a "Geriatric Assessment" at the Cleveland Clinic. I'm doing this because I want to have AND want my primary care and objectively measured "baseline" of my health and my capacity to function at age 60. As I continue to grow older, my doctors (a consultative *"normal for* geriatrician and a primary care doctor) and I will use this baseline to compare and monitor my functional health as I age into older adulthood. I believe that's how health care should work for all of us living our later life. Serving Our Seniors is a geriatric social service funded by the Erie County Senior Services Tax Levy. Its mission is to provide services that support Erie County citizens, age 60+, to continue healthy living and maintain functional independence.

Hashmi explained that the physiology of someone 60+ is different from a young or middleaged adult. "One would never treat a 10-year-old and a 50-year-old in the same way. Yet, the health care system seems to have no problem treating an 80-year-old as if that

patient were a 40-year-old," he said. Geriatricians are trained in treating older bodies. All are Board Certified Internists or Family Medicine physicians with additional Board Certification in Geriatrics. When they further their education in geriatric medicine, Hashmi explains, "We are trained to 'unlearn' what was taught in med school and

68 years, Paul H. Ruthsatz, whom she



Kelleys Island Schools Field Station 2021 Recap

I would like to thank the Kelleys Island Community for another wonderful season at the Kelleys Island Schools Field Station! There were so countless memorable moments that we were able to create and share with so many people. Much of our planning begins in late January, applying for grants to support the programs, reaching out to a variety of wildlife experts, volunteers, staff, and other community leaders who all help make the programs informative and enjoyable. Planning continues throughout the winter and spring, so we are ready to hit the ground running in May!

This past spring, we welcomed Marrisa Dowalter, as our seasonal Field Biologist at the Field Station. She is pursuing a master's degree at Ohio University studying ecology and evolutionary biology with a focus on herpetology. Marissa was an amazing asset to the Field Station, community, and our programs. Her energy, willingness to learn, while being a great team player was very much appreciated and she will be missed.

There were over forty volunteers who helped us this season donating 500+ volunteer hours. In addition, just over

\$3,700 in grant and in-kind monies from: Hancock-Wood County Cooperative Foundation (camp supplies), Ohio Division of Wildlife (fishing poles), Kelleys Island Audubon Club (camp fees and lunches), Kelleys Island Ferry Boat Line (transportation for Science Saturday Speakers), and the Jet Express (transportation to PIB for Nature Campers). The Field Station participated in the Kelleys Island 5/10K, Celebrate KI, Kelleys Island Homecoming, and the Pollinators & Partnerships Ribbon Cutting. We reached out to nearly 1,500 visitors at these events from near and far. It is an honor to be a part of these community events.

We continued our partnership with the Kelleys Island State Park and the Kelleys Island Audubon Club hosting our popular Science Saturdays. This is a weekly series of events that features interactive exploration centered around a particular wildlife topic. Families and learners of all ages came to explore the hands-on science fun, reaching out to over 2,500 participants this year. Our topics included geology, snakes, plankton, bats, monarch butterflies, bees, fish, and so

much more. Thank you to the Kelleys Island Ferry Boat Line who assisted us in ferry transportation for our speakers.

Nature Camp is always the favorite part of my job. I get to be around some of the best people young and old who make the camp program a wonderful success. We had over eighty nature campers 4-14 years old. The camp theme this year was "Everything Under the Sun." Each day covered a different theme: fish, astronomy, birds, insects, geology, and a kayaking day for the older campers. The Nature Camp mission is to encourage children's natural curiosity of the outdoors by engaging them in fun and educational activities. We could not do this successfully without the families, friends, volunteers, and the love that goes into supporting this program.
