

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The Elusive Queen of Hearts... FOUND!

An increasingly large crowd has been searching for the Queen of Hearts since September 2020. In June, she was finally found behind the #52 card at the West Bay Inn. Carmen Smith was the lucky winner of the Jackpot.

of the Jackpot. The Queen of Hearts game is played by purchasing tickets for \$1 apiece with no limit on the number of tickets purchased. Each purchaser writes their name and phone number on the ticket along with a number that corresponds to an available card on the Queen of Hearts board. All the cards are face down on the board and stamped with a number from 1-54. When a ticket is picked, the card number written on the ticket is turned over. If the Queen of Hearts is revealed and the person who purchased the ticket is present, they win 80% of the jackpot, 10% of the jackpot will be donated, and the remaining 10% will be rolled over into the next Jackpot. If the person is not present, they win 50% of the jackpot. The remaining 50% remains in the jackpot for the next drawing. If the first ticket drawn reveals the Queen of Spades, Queen of Clubs, or Queen of Diamonds, the person wins \$100. If the first ticket drawn reveals the Joker, the person wins \$50. If the first ticket drawn reveals a face card or an ace, the person wins \$25. Once a card is selected, it will be removed from play and shown face up on the board. Each week after the drawing, all tickets for that week's drawing will be destroyed. West Bay started hosting the Queen of

Hearts game in the summer of 2019. Since that time, the Queen has paid out \$84,223 in winnings and donated \$12,244 to the Kelleys Island EMS. The biggest Jackpot to date was won on June 9, 2022 and was a whopping \$62,415. That Jackpot started with just \$319 in September 2020. Carmen Smith was present when her ticket was pulled, so she took home \$49,931! EMS received \$6,241 and the rest carried over for the new game Carmen, a local artist on the Island, had only played the Queen of Hearts one other week before she won. She is sharing her money with two friends; one of which is building a mobile glassblowing studio on the Island, which will be a great addition to the Kelleys Island arts community. Carmen is also a newlywed. Her husband has been deployed since the wedding, so she will spend some of her winnings on a honeymoon when he returns from active duty in September. On July 21, the Jackpot was over \$10,000. It grows every week until the Queen of Hearts is revealed. The drawings are held every Thursday at the West Bay Inn at 7:00 pm. A new game of Queen of Hearts has been started at the Casino with drawings on Tuesday nights. This gives everyone a chance to win two Jackpots! If you're feeling lucky, join the crowd and take a chance to find the elusive Queen of Hearts.





Firelands Symphony Orchestra Seeks New Executive Director

SANDUSKY, OH – Firelands Symphony Orchestra (FSO) is looking for a new executive director. The current executive director, Tricia Applegate, will be vacating the role at the end of July. Applegate had served in the post for over two years, and successfully navigated the organization through a series of unforeseen trials and tribulations.

On Applegate's first day in the role, The Sandusky State Theatre, which is the orchestra's regular concert home, was destroyed by a storm. In addition to the loss of the orchestra's venue, Applegate also had to navigate the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, which caused cancellation of many of the 2019-2020 season concerts.

Applegate rose to the challenge and put together a full, outdoor summer season at local venues like the Jackson Street Pier and Norwalk Reservoir when it was safer to gather again. In addition, she also expanded the Around Town Tour series to bring small ensemble groups to perform at various community events and local businesses throughout Erie, Ottawa, and Huron counties. She also found funding to create a new Tunes for Tuesday program that brought live music performances to local assisted living facilities each week. This program still continues today. 'We wanted to make sure that as soon as it was safe to do so, we found new and creative ways to present music to our communities. Music has such healing power and really brings communities together during tough times, and we saw that need in our own community especially during the pandemic," said Applegate. Due to the Sandusky State Theatre still being under renovation, Applegate was instrumental in finding new venues for the FSO to perform at for the upcoming 2022-2023 season, which will be presented at the newly renovated Sawmill Creek Resort. "Our unofficial motto over the last couple of years was 'we will play anywhere we can', which led to a lot of new partnerships with local venues and more community members getting to experience the orchestra for the first time," commented Applegate.

Applegate will be taking her talents to Ohio Northern University where she will serve as director of Freed Performing Arts Center.

FSO board president Nike Mendenhall commented, "The FSO board recognizes the many contributions and the successful events Tricia led during her two-year-plus tenure with the orchestra. With grateful hearts, we wish her success in her new position – a fabulous opportunity for Tricia. We look forward to bringing on board a new executive director soon to continue our mission to enrich lives through music."





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UT Kelleys Island Gang Celebrate 50 Years

The Kelleys Island State Park had a special group of friends visit recently; in fact, they were celebrating their 50th anniversary of this gathering. They call themselves "The UT Kelleys Island Gang" but most other campers refer to them as "the flamingo people." The reason being that a requirement for "Gang" members is they must display a flamingo at their campsite to distinguish them as a part of the group.

It all started with a 1970 Chevy El Camino which was purchased new by member Beth and her late husband and caught the attention and instant friendship of other University of Toledo students and so the group was born. Beth has since sold the car to member Lee who continues the tradition of bringing the car along to the annual gatherings.



In June of 1973, friends Jack, Bob and Steve had a discussion over a beer about organizing an annual event to get the group together; they decided on making the Kelleys Island State Park the official meeting place on the weekend after the July 4th holiday. They reflect on their first years with happy memories of taking the old Neumann boat line to the west dock, the entrance to the state park being just a small ranger shack, campsites were only about \$6 a night with one main gravel drive in and around the campground, there being only outhouses with tent camping being the norm (a tradition that continues). A big deal one particular year was giving them Governor Celeste credit for the construction of the new "cathedral" shower house. They take whatever campsites are available and stay regardless of weather conditions, recalling the excitement of waterspouts. The original group consisted of about 50 members although they have, lost seven. About 30 return annually from as far away as Montana, Virginia, Georgia, Florida, North Carlina, and Indiana. They spoke fondly of Police Chief "Charlie" whom they had a pretty good relationship with despite an accumulation of various tickets, arrests, injuries, and alcohol

violations. The group now boasts three generations and at least one engagement during one of their gatherings. Another tradition that

continues is "The Walk" from the state park to what was in earlier years Kamp Kellisle and is now West Bay. It was certainly a pleasure to meet and host this great group of friends to hear their stories and we look forward to their return next year and years to come!



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Audubon Happenings

Well, just like "that," we find ourselves at the end of summer and anticipating fall activities and weather on the Island. Although summer always seems to be too short, fall is a beautiful time to enjoy the natural beauty of Kelleys Island and Lake Erie. The Kelleys Island Audubon Club (KIAC) offers opportunities to residents and visitors to learn about nature and birding on the island during the fall months.

Our regular meeting will be held on Thursday, September 15, at the Community Park on Addison Street. Bring a dish to pass as well as your place setting and drink to the pavilion at the park at 6:00 PM to join us for a potluck dinner. At 7:00 PM, the educational program will begin featuring a presentation by Rob Swindell, President of the Black River Audubon Society, and his wife, Gina, who is also on the Black River Audubon Society Board. Rob and Gina will discuss their recent conservation efforts to save Cromwell Park in Lorain as well as other outreach and advocacy efforts they have undertaken in their community.

Fall songbird migration will be underway throughout the month of September and the KIAC

"Feathers and Foliage" bird banding event will be held on Sunday, September 18, at the Jones Preserve on Long Point. Join Tom and Paula Bartlett as they continue their Avian Research study by netting, banding, recording vital information, and then releasing birds that use Kelleys Island as a refueling stop on their migration south for the winter. The KIAC will have an informational booth set up on September 18 and the Bartletts will continue to band birds on Long Point through September 22, weather permitting.

On October 13, the Bartletts return to the Island for the ever-popular Northern Saw-whet Owl Banding, after dusk at the Scheele Preserve on Monaghan Street and the North Pond on Ward Road. Evening banding of the owls will continue through November 22 and songbird banding in the morning on Long Point will resume from October 14-November 16, again weather permitting.

With the cooler days and the fall foliage, September and October are perfect months to get out and explore the many walking trails throughout the Island. Keep your eyes looking up to catch a glimpse of our feathered companions on Kelleys Island.

No - not your surplus zucchini, but seeds from your plants for next year's gardens. The Kellevs Island Library has a seed library that needs to be restocked every year. A seed library is a centrally located place where people can donate seeds from their healthy plants in the fall and take the seeds they want for their next crop, now or in the spring, at no cost.

Our seed library is in the Kelleys Island School Library in an old card catalogue (remember those?) It is available during regular library hours: Monday 5:00 - 7:00 pm, Tuesday and Thursday 1:00 - 3:00 pm, Wednesday 10:00 am - noon, and Saturday, 10:00 am - noon. Currently we have lots of flower seeds, among them cosmos, hollyhocks, marigold, Mexican sunflowers, regular sunflowers, baptisia, and zinnia. In the vegetable category, we have beans, regular peppers, heirloom peppers, dill, oregano, zucchini, and cherry tomato seeds but we would love to have a bigger supply and variety in both categories.

Donating is easy – there are envelopes and empty medicine bottles in the last card catalogue drawers or bring your seeds already in small containers. Please label your seeds with the plant name and year they were harvested. If you have more time, it is nice to include extra information such as sun requirements, best locations for planting, necessity for staking, and if self-seeding is an issue. We have some lovely and productive gardens on Kelleys Island. Please help encourage more of them.

Serving Our Seniors Wants Kelleys Island Residents 65+ to call for Help with Medicare Part D

There is a strict time period for Medicare consumers to look for a different Medicare Prescription Drug Plan (aka Part D plan) each year. This time period, called "Open Enrollment," is October 15 through and including December 7. It is your opportunity to find the best coverage at the best price so you can save money.

If you are someone who is think-ing like this... "I'm happy with my Medicare Part D Plan, so I'm not going to do anything." I don't want to be bothered with looking for another insurance." Serving Our Seniors wants you to think again wants you to think again.

What most Medicare consumers don't understand is that the Medicare

Part D plan they currently have, today, is probably changing what medicines it will cover in 2023 and the extent to which it will cover one or more specific medications.

Each year, it is common for Part D plans to stop paying for a particular medication entirely by removing specific drugs it from its list of "covered medications." Another tactic is changing the quantity of pills the Part D plan will cover. For instance, it may pay for a name brand drug, but when one reads the fine print, it is discovered that the plan only pays for the first 90-day supply. After that, the consumer pays for it out of their own pocket.

Insurance companies that sell Part D plans are mandated to send out letter notifying consumers of upcoming changes in their existing prescription coverage for 2023. However, too many customers treat the letters as junk mail, so the information is never read. As a result, they are stuck with their Medicare Part D plan for the whole year and discover the hard way that it is costing more money and isn't covering their medications to the extent that was expected.

Serving Our Seniors can help Kelleys Island residents find the Medicare Part D plan that covers their prescribed medications best. We can even tell you the cost estimate according to www.Mediare.gov.

Serving Our Seniors does not sell insurance, nor do we care from whom you purchase your Medicare Part D insurance. We are Medicare consumer advocates for Erie County residents, ages 60+. We want you to know the cost of your coverage in 2023 and how well it will/will not pay for your medications if you decide to stay with what you have.

Appointments are on a first-come, first-serve basis. This can be accomplished by ZOOM or by telephone. If you would like help making sense out of Medicare Part D, call Serving Our Seniors at 419-624-1856. Ask to for Medicare Part D appointment.

(Serving Our Seniors is a 501 (c) 3, non-profit, geriatric social service, which advocates for Erie County residents, ages 60+ to maintain their health and their functional independence. Serving Our Seniors is funded by the Erie County Senior Services Tax Levy, private donations and local grants.)


sudden fall.

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
1871 – Trieschman's Meat Market

Leslie Korenko, From the book Kelleys Island 1866-1871 – The Lodge, Suffrage & Baseball by Leslie Korenko.

December 1871 - "This is the first winter in the history of the Island that a regular butcher shop has been attempted to be kept up. Until next Spring, Mr. Henry Trishman [Trieschman] will keep open shop in the old Barber rooms on Division Street, opposite the Island House, and keep constantly on hand (whenever he can get the beeves, &c.), a good assortment of steaks and roasts at reasonable rates. It is to be hoped that he will receive that degree of encouragement by a liberal patronage, as to make it profitable to do likewise every year, as the trouble of providing fresh meats for the table have been one of our greatest inconveniences of winter life. Success to the butcher and long may he wave is our sentiment on this subject."





Now it is the Island Market.





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


