#### New Playground At Community Park

Play is a childs work. Vital to physical and mental well being, especially in this day and age when screen time dominates our days. There is no greater learning tool than play. It fosters physical and emotional skills as well as independence, socialization and community. All through child directed interaction. PLUS, it's fun!

The new playground which will be a bit larger than its previous footprint will offer everything needed to enrich childrens play life. Most importantly...it's inclusive. This means it's designed to serve the needs of all children, including those with challenges. ADA accessible means a child with a wheel chair can access the play area and enjoy the benefits that weren't available in the past. Specific areas also take into consideration kids with other needs. For instance, children who struggle with ASD, Autistic Spectrum Disorder, can use The Serenity Spot or Stem play when socialization or even physical play can be difficult for them. Beyond the swings and slides there is a plenty to keep a child busy at play. Musical play includes a xylophone and a babel drum. Research shows that music is instrumental (pun intended) to math, motor skills and language development. Stem Play is a regular part of curriculum in class-rooms as a learning tool. Motion Play enhances balance and coordination. The Volta Spinner, Air Venture Glider and Multi User Swing can help achieve those strengths.

The Firehouse Exploration Station is all about imagination and socialization. What child doesn't love a little house? Other components such as the balance beam and

climbing ladders enhance agility and focus among other things. Of course, traditional swings and slides are fun for all and one of the swings is ADA accessible.

The first steps to achieving the goal of a new playground was to apply for grants and funding. Much of the contributions were awarded based on this inclusivity. This is where the additional cost comes into "play" (pun intended). To achieve accessibility for special needs, we have to put in specialized turf that can accommodate wheel chairs. Mulch will not work.

Although other forms of recreation have been proposed, this state of the art playground is the most cost effective and easiest to maintain. It also stays within the aesthetics of Community Park.

In order to make this play facility a reality we need to raise more money. The park Board is funded solely through grants and donation and although we have raised the money for the equipment, we still need to gather money through donation to complete the flooring. You can help and be a part of Kelleys Island History by making a donation to Community Chest, the non profit that raises funds for

many island events. They accept checks or you can use the QR code to make a donation. Be sure to indicate donation is for New Play ground.

It is August, nearing the end of summer, but a very productive summer.

First, I would like to welcome our new Village Administrator, Andy Federle. Andy was appointed June 12 and comes with a great employment background, is a full time resident and we are very happy to have him

One of four major items I wanted to accomplish in my term as mayor was to see a public sanitary sewer system for the village become a reality. The last week of June the state legislators brought that idea to more of a possibility by voting to award the village Two Million Dollars for study and planning of the project. WOW, what a win-win for Kelleys Island. A special thanks goes out to Representative DJ Swearingen, Senator Theresa Gavarone, Nathanael Jonhenry, and Leeane Alexicos.

Another item I wanted to see completed was to see a new waterline and paving of Huntington Road South. As we are reading this article the project should be almost completed if not already completed. As one resident told me, this road has been a disaster for over thirty years not to mention how many times the village has had to fix the many water leaks. It is a great improvement.

We are now completing another major project at the airport. The airport is receiving new modern lighting for the runway. This is a project costing approximately \$750,000.00 and will be paid for by the Federal Aviation Administration with a five percent match from the State of Ohio, and another five percent from the village. This will greatly enhance the safety for the pilots that have to fly here at night. Let's remember this is our only way off the island in the dead of winter and if there is a medical emergency at night or during inclement weather, this will be beneficial for all involved.

Our Community Health Center has been very well received. Along with patient care, there have been many improvements to the Golias House. It looks fantastic!

The list does not stop here as there have been many improvements over the past four years. I am very proud of what we are accomplishing and I believe we are headed in the right direction. With this being said, I will be running for a second term as Mayor.


This year's event will take place on





#### Looking back on the Fourth of July

July 4, 1872 - The 4th of July evening social entertainment will be given at Kelley's Hall which will undoubtedly be a fine affair. The Great Western Band has been engaged to furnish the music. An efficient committee of arrangements have the matter in charge, and will spare no effort to make every one feel at home. A very quiet day. Everybody and his wife went to Sandusky to attend Barnum's show and until night the Island had more the appearance of a quiet Sabbath than a National holiday. July 4, 1874 – The glorious Fourth of July 1874 is past, and those who survived the perils of the day without burnt fingers or accidents may rejoice over the good time they had burning powder and making a noise. The papers will herald the calamities of the day and the doctors will have a good time binding up the wounded, or rather in getting paid for binding up the wounded. Thus, pleasure and pain go hand in hand together. A very large crowd came over on the steamer Ferris in the evening accompanied by the Germania Reed Band. Kelley's Hall was crowded and a pleasant dance until midnight was participated in by the islanders and strangers.







#### The Bittersweet Farewell: The "Irish Goodbye" of a Hometown Business

As the curtain falls on a remarkable 63-year journey, we bid a fond farewell to a local business that has seen multiple rebrandings and transformations. The tale of this enterprise is a testament to resilience, adaptability, and the ever-changing landscape of entrepreneurship. In a twist of irony, the closing of this business echoes the spirit of the "Irish Goodbye" - quietly slipping away without drawing attention. 1. Genesis: The Humble Beginnings (1960-1988) It all started in 1960 when the doors of the original entity opened. The Dairy Isle, offered delicious whipped ice cream treats from a Taylor freeze, brought from W 117th St. to the local community. Desserts like milkshakes and root beer floats, strawberry shortcakes and sandwiches with fun names were developed and enjoyed for years. Over those years, several rebrandings followed, each capturing the spirit of innovation and responding to the ever-changing business landscape. Vintage t shirts and old menus tell a story from the days when the island had not quite been transformed to its new incarnation. At this time, transportation was the core of the business until the folding of the Neuman ferry.

**3. The Power of Beer:** A Series of small breweries and their visions,

were inspiring enough for the Johnson family to add the Kelleys Island Brewery. Opened in 1999 as a feeder business to Neuman boat line, when it unexpectedly folded in 2002, 95% of the daily income was gone. The commerce could only be recovered by innovation and that was bringing groups to the island, and so again, as unpopular as it was, it was a trend that supported the business and the community. Throughout its journey, this business went through a remarkable metamorphosis, resulting in the establishment of many different brands and types of hand crafted beer. While other establishments responded to emerging trends, the KIB and its staff could not continue the diversification and specialization that current business models have adapted to. They could no longer meet the needs of the community while striving for longevity in a

competitive environment.
4. The Final Bow: The "Irish Goodbye" (2022) After 63 years of remarkable achievements, the time has come for the final act. With a sense of irony and poetic closure, the business will gracefully exit the stage, leaving behind a legacy of resilience, innovation, and much community support. The decision to embrace the metaphorical "Irish Goodbye" reflects the spirit of humility, honoring the memories made throughout the years while recognizing that all good things must come to an end. And a nod to the items placed in the rock walls and bar that hold this labour of love. In this bittersweet moment, we honor the business and its supporters, its employees, its family and all of the love that has been poured into the land that we have stewarded. It has weathered countless rebranded many times, and witnessed the birth of many children and deaths of countless friends and island family members. It stands as a testament to the ever-changing nature of life and entrepreneurship and the inevitable evolution of the business landscape. When people walked in the doors for the last 10 years I used to say, "Welcome to America!" to remind us all of the privilege we have here to enjoy capitalism and small business.

As we bid adieu, let us celebrate the indomitable spirit that propelled this enterprise forward, and may its legacy serve as an inspiration for future endeavours in our community.

#### The Island In July 1873

Leslie Korenko

"There are about the usual amount of visitors here this summer. The hotel 'is nearly full. Hemelein's [Himmelein] has quite a number. A party was up from Cleveland last week. This Island, when there is sufficient accommodation, must be the favorite resort for Clevelanders. Gentlemen having families here can take the Cleveland boat in the evening and have a good night's rest and be back early in the morning; and can leave Cleveland at evening and be here by one o'clock. I do not know as there will ever be hotel accommodations enough for all who want to come here, and when I see clergymen and ladies of respectability at watering places, who have left all their decency at home, drinking and carousing after all honest folks should be in bed, I wish and hope if I have to live here, there will never be accommodations for a popular resort. There were a good many here on the Fourth and the dance at the Hall was orderly and respectable. A good many Islanders attended. [The Cleveland Plain Dealer picked up this tidbit, remarking, "Evidently this pious young man sat up to see what mischief was going on. Plainly, he is in course of preparation for a great reformer."] An invitation was given to all who were interested in the Woman Suffrage movement to meet at the residence of E. K. Huntington last Tuesday evening. Only a few attended. There are quite a number who believe that 'taxation without representation is tyranny,' but prefer to submit to the injustice rather than exert their influence to make it different. A tea party will keep most of the women from such a meeting. The intelligent portion of the voters, I believe, would give the franchise to women if they thought a majority of the women wanted it. I doubt if they would be willing to give up their privilege of voting if 9/10 of the men did not wish to vote. One voter said to me that he doubted if it was within a woman's sphere to vote. He said it did not interfere with any of his duties, but I suppose he thought that if women were given the privilege we would want to vote all the time and do nothing else. But these questions and a good many more have been answered thousands of times. I do not blame any one here for making these objections to woman's suffrage, it is to be expected in a place where nothing is read or talked about in its favor and see nothing in the papers but slurs and ridicule to make it odious. I expect folks will call me old and ugly to write all this, but I am not as old as I shall be if I live long enough to see

women vote, and perhaps not so ugly as some who don't want to vote. [Emeline was already 54 years old.] We have almost hourly opportunities to go to the continent. The Riverside stops here four times, the Cooke twice and the Gazelle twice, making 12 arrivals and departures each day, besides from 6 to 10 sail vessels. The Cleveland steam boat has not put in an appearance yet, but she is expected to be out very soon when we shall have tri-weekly steam communication with that place. The Rev. Mr. Holbrook has a donation party to-night. Some of his congregation think his health would be benefited with a trip this summer, and take this method of furnishing

the means for him to do it, and also to show their love and appreciation of him as a friend and pastor. EKH" Emeline would take heat again for writing this article. This time from the manager of the Island House. "Your correspondent EKH in the Register of to-day in speaking of summer resorts rather deprecates the conduct of those who visit those places. I wish to say the remarks have no reference to the Island House. We have no ministers here that I know of, and the House, since I have had the honor of managing it, has been remarkably free from 'drinking and carousing when honest folks should be in bed.' I am charitable enough however to think

that EKH perhaps had the same object in view as when a few weeks ago the Sarah Van Epps had to take a raking in order to give the writer a chance to say a good word for Woodhull and George Francis Train and I think 'woman's suffrage' was what was the matter this time. [Among Train's many projects, he supported Woman's Suffrage.] I would respectfully ask EKH in further not to drag steamboats and hotels into any such company. C. C. Townley" Emeline Kelley Huntington hoped to live long enough to see women vote.

My partner in ministry Dawn Soldner is always teaching me things about Kelleys. She has helped me see that there are so many colors on a rock beach.





#### Fish Ohio Recognition Program

The Fish Ohio program recognizes anglers for noteworthy catches of Ohio's fish. Since 1976, more than 410,000 anglers have been recognized for their catches. The Ohio Division of Wildlife took over the program's

management in 1980.

Each angler with a qualifying catch receives a collectible Fish Ohio lapel pin. Each year's pin has a different species of fish on it, along with the year, so the pin that the angler receives won't necessarily have the same fish on it as the qualifying fish caught.

There is also a Master Angler

category for anglers who catch four different Fish Ohio-qualifying species in a single year. The Master Angler pin is the same as the Fish Ohio pin except it is gold in color.



The 2023 pin will feature a walleve.

Anglers will receive a Fish Ohio pin for their first entry each year, and a Master Angler pin for qualifying entries in four different species categories in the same year.

Fish must be taken by legal angling and not from pay lakes.

The deadline for application for the year is December 31.

Possible state record fish must be kept frozen for verification by the Outdoor Writers of Ohio.

#### Lake Erie Fish Ohio Report (Updated 7/25/23)

The daily limit for walleye in Ohio waters of Lake Erie is 6 fish per angler. The minimum size limit for walleye is 15 inches.

The daily limit for yellow perch is 30 in the West and East Zones of Ohio waters of Lake Erie. The daily limit is 10 in the Central Zone of Ohio waters of Lake Erie.

The trout and salmon daily limit is 5 fish per angler. The minimum size limit is 12 inches.

Black bass (largemouth and smallmouth bass): The daily limit is 5 fish per angler with a 14 inch minimum size limit.

Walleye: Many walleye are beginning to move east as waters warm. Trollers are doing well with deep diving stickbaits, spoons, and worm harnesses in 40-55' of water. Trolling north or east of Kellys Island and across the Canadian border near Pelee Island has produced the best catches, with successful trips out of Cranberry

Creek, Lorain, and Avon Lake as well. Leads 100'+ back unassisted or 50-80' back with divers or 2 to 4-ounce snap weights have been working well at speeds around 2 mph. Kept walleye are regularly 18"+ long, with many 25"+ fish as well. Most trips are also seeing plenty of shorts. Remember the daily limit is 6 fish, with a minimum size of 15 inches.

Yellow Perch: Perch fishing is beginning to pick up as waters warm. Anglers are doing well in the west off Catawba near the firing range and south of Green Island. The Toledo Harbor Lighthouse and Toledo water intake have also been successful locations. Anglers are using perch or crappie rigs with spreaders and minnow bait. Yellow perch are averaging 7-9" long.

The water temperature off Toledo is 75 degrees, off Cleveland 74 degrees, and off Erie 75 degrees.


