The Glacial Grooves Geological Preserve

The power of nature created the Glacial Grooves. On Friday May 19, the Glacial Grooves were re-introduced as The Glacial Grooves Geological Preserve. The ceremony was well attended by The Ohio Department of Natural Resources, The Ohio History Connection, The Ohio Geological Survey and the community and visitors to Kelleys Island.

Kelleys Island Mayor, Ron Ehbar spoke first, thanking all who attended and recognizing the value of the Glacial Grooves to the island. He introduced Mary Mertz, The Director of Ohio Natural Resources. Mary spear-headed the project after a visit to the grooves. She recognized that changes needed to be made. The natural landmark is the biggest one of its kind known to humans. It has fossils unique to this area and the time period of glacial movement across northern Ohio. The work was completed in close collaboration with The Ohio Geological Survey team of, Tom Valachovics, Geologist, JD Stucker, Assistant Chief, Andy Dash, Geologist and Group Supervisor, and D. Mark Jones, Division Chief, and with close consultation with The Ohio History Connection. The grooves were cleaned of vegetation growth, new see through fencing was installed, 7 education stations were placed around the grooves, landscaping completed to encourage leisurely and safe visits, and connecting paths built making the quarry paths and the Lake Side Daisies accessible.

Megan Woods, CEO and Executive Director of The Ohio History Connection, spoke next. She recognized the historical significance of the Grooves and other entities on the island. She praised the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, The Ohio Geological Survey Team, Chris Ashley, Leader of Ohio State Parks on Kelleys Island, volunteer Dave Coon of Kelleys Island and Glen Cobb for their continued work to preserve the site and keep it pristine for visitors. Finally, she handed the ownership and care of The Glacial Grooves to The Ohio Department of Natural Resources.

The Grooves will remain as a National Natural Landmark, soon to be added to the list of international natural landmarks. It is the largest easily accessible grooves in the world. With these final words, the representatives of the collaboration in the restoration, took their places along the red ribbon, each one with red scissors in hand, and cut the ribbon! Visitors were invited by the Geologists present, to take

Hello, May was filled with island reunions, home openings and more importantly, all of our businesses are ready for our locals and visitors. We have had many calls about the Glacial Grooves, our traditional Island events, and some people looking for Chamber Rentals with openings for Island stay's.

5/10 K Walk/Run Sunday, June 4, 2023

Get ready for the 40th Annual 5/10 K Kick! Participants will enjoy a scenic route along the lakefront to enjoy the architecture and local unique flair of this Chamber Sponsored Island tradition. Numerous water stations along the way give the locals a great opportunity to volunteer and see the faces of the runners that come to participate in our yearly event. This year our proceeds will again be going to the Village Park Beautification project. The canon shoots at 10:45 am off for the start of the races from Memorial Park.

Registration

Same-day registration begins downtown, in Memorial Park, at 8:00 am-10 am. A discounted rate of \$20 will be available to those who preregister online before midnight on May 29. Day-of registration will be \$25. Online registration closes one week before the race date. Register before midnight May 29 to be guaranteed a race shirt. Great Lakes Islands Alliance (GLIA) Summit - October 4, 2022 What is GLIA?

The Great Lakes Island Alliance (GLIA) is a newer voluntary, collaborative network that brings together island leaders, residents, and advocates from across the region. The mission of the GLIA is to encourage relationship building, foster information exchange, and leverage resources to address shared challenges and embrace opportunities to benefit islands. The GLIA has connected remote communities by increasing the membership to over 150 people from 19 different island communities. The members facilitate monthly conference calls to share information between communities, along with the annual summits. The

first summit was held in 2017 on Beaver Island, Michigan, followed by Madeline Island, Wisconsin in 2018, then on Mackinac Island, Michigan in 2019. Last year we were part of the summit and were well received with our tour of the grooves, alvar and the Herndon Galleries. The luncheon at the school was a great event in itself. The Lake Erie Islands (South Bass Island, Middle Bass Island, Kelleys Island, and Pelee Island) were toured by more than 100 members from October 2nd-5th. This year's summit will be replaced with a focused retreat on the findings from the UMichigan and help set up a stage for a successful Summit in the fall of 2024.





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

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German Reformed Church

June Campbell

By 1865 the island was buzzing with European immigrants who worked in the thriving industry of quarrying with all its supporting operations of a lime kiln, barrel shop, hoop-making shop and shipping of the quarry products. Many German immigrants were

employed working on farms, especially vineyards and in the several wineries flourishing from the excellent quality of grapes which produced very good wines. Over 100 tons of grapes were harvested in 1865. Cases of KI wine were shipped to the east coast for consumption by sophisticated city folk. Young willow tree branches were used to tie up grapevines. Mr. Carpenter rented his wine cellar to individual farmers, and the Kelley's Island Wine Company was formed.

Fishing was generating a good profit with catches of large and small mouth bass, black bass and pickerel

for shipping to large cities on the mainland. Hotels hosted private fishermen and their families. Addison Kelley's mansion was completed. Island soldiers were returning from their service in Ohio Infantry divisions during the Civil War.

The Island Queen was motorcruising the lake with passengers and freight. Exports of the quarry and wineries and grape harvest expected to reach \$400,000. Five neighborhood schools educated 200 island children. The library contained 36 books and grew to over 400 volumes within 10 years. Building of many new houses began on the south shore and attested to the island's prosperity. Ten acres of land could be purchased for less than \$1,000. Dirt roads became dusty or muddy in season. Immigrants appeared to be very, enterprising, ambitious and hard-working. The population was approximately 800 residents.





During this era of prosperity, the religious needs were evolving from private in-home services and prayer meetings.

St. Michael the Archangel Roman Catholic Church was built in 1863, "a plain but neat little stone church." A group of Protestants with divergent views on religious subjects organized into The Union Evangelical later Church, becoming The First Congregational Church. The German Reformed Church was organized to serve the large population Germans.

conducted It services totally in the German language, singing, Bible readings, preaching. Property on Division Street was acquired, and they began

building by quarrying stone on their land across the street. A vibrant congregation soon grew to 25 families. The Ladies Aid Society held ice cream socials and craft bazaars, and a Sunday School flourished. Soon a parsonage was added for the minister's residence and an opensided roofed "haul shed" housed the horses of worshipers. Ministers were Rev.Kness, Rev. Merchikens, Rev. J G. Kuhl, Rev. W. Renter and Rev. Wm. Frirolin, Rev. Honecker and Rev. E. Koehne.

The prosperity and vibrancy of 1865 – 1919 ended abruptly when Prohibition was enacted by federal law. The wine and grape-growing industry were shutdown. About the same time the North Quarry, lime kiln and associated shops closed, Peak population of 1174 in 1900 dropped to 658 in the 1920. No work was available on the island for all those jobless workers, so they had to leave Kelleys Island to find work to support their families. With the decreasing island population they soon couldn't afford a minister, and the empty parsonage was for rent. The German Reformed stone church closed their doors in 1924. The last service was a funeral for William Burger, one of the founding members.

Fifty years later a group of island residents (now known as The Kelleys Island Historical Assocaition) were concerned about the deteriorating condition of the old stone church. The first question was who owns the property? There was no German Reformed denomination any more. A different of reformed series organizations had joined into one Reformed Church of America which later accepted the Congregational denomination and became the United Church of Christ. The island group organized with 104 Charter Members and became the Kelleys Island Historical Association and soon began negotiating to purchase the property of church, parsonage, outhouse and haul shed site totaling more than an acre. Conditions of the sale were The church had to be explicit: restored to its original condition within 10 years, and no other organized religion could hold services within. Immediately the members got to work to clean and clean and clean, repair, rebuild, refurbish inside and out. Original furniture was found in various homes, the pot-bellied stove




German Reformed Church, Kelleys Island in 1865

was found and rebuilt, pews had been stored in a barn and were retrieved, hymnals and the original Bible were returned to their church home.

A new roof was necessary, new ceiling inside, holes in walls patched and repainted, the gilded design forming a frame around the center of the chancel was pieced together like a puzzle, pews and chancel furniture were scrubbed with Murphy's soap, the pump organ was rebuilt by a generous member. Outside projects included the steeple's rotting beams replaced, island men with masonry skills tuck-pointed the outside walls with modern cement to stabilize the beach- stone walls, windows were given new glass and putty, and much, much more. Pictures are in the museum documenting the progress. were raised through Funds memberships, bake sales, raffles, Butterfly Festivals and many generous donations.

By 1985 United Church of Christ was convinced the Kelleys Island Historical Association was serious and diligent and proceeding well to meet the conditions of the sale, and the deed to the buildings and property was transferred to a proud and committed KIHA. Încomplete improvements and necessary maintenance continue to keep the old stone church a bright example of community dedication and pride in preserving the history of our lovely island for the future.

The Association continues to grow in memberships and collections for The Parsonage House the museum. Resale Shop thrives, the Museum and restored church buildings are open daily from Memorial Day to Labor Day and are busy every day. Sis's Cottage was added in 2022 to expand the resale shop, the outhouse was restored 2021. The memorial walk bricks honor the people who love Kelleys Island. The Board of Directors is dedicated to preserving the history of Kelleys İsland, and the volunteers spread their knowledge and enthusiasm to old and new residents, members and visitors. Everyone is invited to stop in and view the splendid collection and displays in the Museum and the plain but classic beauty of the restored church. Shopping in the Parsonage and Cottage, where everything is donated, helps in the maintenance of the German Reformed Church, an Island Treasure.





A Rare Island Sighting and a Tale of Inspiration: Kirtland Warbler

In a 2012 Hoot Owl, a short article appeared about a Kirtland Warbler sighting on the eastern end of Woodford Road. It is interesting that the sighting was considered so rare as to be newsworthy. Here is the story behind the excitement.

Once upon a time, in the dense forests of Michigan, there lived a small and delicate bird called the Kirtland warbler. With its yellow throat and black-and-gray striped back, the Kirtland warbler was a beautiful and unique creature that had captured the hearts of birdwatchers and environmentalists alike. This species is named after Dr. Jared Kirtland, a Cleveland, Ohio physician and amateur naturalist, who collected the first specimen in 1851.

However, in the mid-1900's, the Kirtland warbler faced a serious threat

to its existence. The forests it called home were being cleared for logging and other human activities and the bird's habitat was shrinking rapidly. The Kirtland warbler was on the brink of e x t i n c t i o n, a l a r m i n g environmentalists and bird watchers

alike. That's when a team of conservationists and biologists came together to launch a mission to save the Kirtland warbler. They studied the bird's behavior, habitat, and mating patterns to gain a better understanding of its needs.

They found that one of the most unique aspects of the Kirtland's warbler is its nesting habits. It only nests in young jack pine forests that are between five and twenty years old, and the trees must be of a certain height and

density. This is because the Kirtland's warbler feeds almost exclusively on the larvae of a single insect, the jack pine budworm, which is most abundant in these young jack pine forests. They worked tirelessly to restore the jack pine forests, planting trees and creating a safe haven for the Kirtland warbler and other endangered species. From a few hundred individuals in the 1970s. this conservation effort by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and other organizations has helped to increase the population to over 2,000 individuals today.

individuals today. Birdwatchers flocked to Michigan to catch a glimpse of the rare bird, and environmentalists celebrated the success of the conservation mission. A few were even seen in Northern Ohio during their fall and spring migration from the Caribbean Islands, where they winter.

As the years passed, the Kirtland warbler has become a symbol of hope and resilience in the face of adversity. Its survival is a testament to the power of conservation and the importance of protecting our planet's natural treasures.

Destination Development Grants Awarded

With this year's grant, The Herndon Gallery will be installing a cement platform overlooking the beach. The platform will be accessible by the new pathway and will encourage visitors to stop and gaze awhile at the beautiful lake and beach scenery. Outdoor music performances are being

planned for this summer, including cellist Brian Shifflet on June 22, 2023.

The Kelleys Island Wine Company will be using the grant to build a commercial grade outdoor play area and to enhance their goat and animal areas. With the upgrades, they hope to continue to grow their inviting outdoors areas.

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Kelleys Island Septic Systems

Hello Islanders,

Did you know that all homes on Kelleys Island rely on household sewage treatment systems aka septic systems? Septic systems do not last forever, and they do require maintenance. Failure to maintain your system or damage to your system can cause premature failure, which can be very costly. In recent years we have seen a growing trend of septic system related issues on Kelleys Island. This letter has some of the basic issues we are observing and tips to protect your septic system.

These are the most common problems occurring on the island:

1) Systems are being overused

and are failing.

a. Rental units have too many people staying in them as property owners are advertising their properties to accommodate large groups.

b. Homes have additional bedrooms being added, including auxiliary buildings like pole barns and above garages.

2) Homeowners/renters are damaging systems by driving over them. This compacts the leaching area of systems and cracks septic tanks.

Homeowners are putting in 3) pools, auxiliary buildings, and additional driveways/parking which is utilizing potential areas for the septic system replacement area.

Here are some tips to protect your system:

1) Septic systems are designed based on the number of bedrooms in a home. Do not add more bedrooms than what was designed for your system.

2) Keep as much natural/ undisturbed green space on your property as possible. Systems eventually fail and onsite treatment is

priority for replacement.3) Maintain isolation distances when adding on to a home, building an auxiliary building, or creating a new hardscape or feature in the yard. Septic systems, including septic

tanks, should be a minimum of 10 feet from foundations, pools, and driveways.

4) Have your septic tank pumped once every 3-5 years.

5) Systems with mechanical components should have a service contractor maintain their system twice a year.

6) Čonsult with the Health Department prior to making anv changes to your property. 419-626-5623 X 5108

Lastly, please be aware that if you do any plumbing work in your home, you or your contractor are required to obtain a plumbing permit. Even if you are not altering your septic system a plumbing permit may be required for changes to your plumbing system or the addition of fixtures in a home or auxiliary building. 

Happenings at St. Michael the Archangel Parish





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Decoration Day (Now Memorial Day) - 1870 & Today

"Decoration Day was appropriately observed by the people of Kelley's Island, who at 4 o'clock assembled at Kelley's Hall, where a very interesting address was delivered by Rev. M. K. Holbrook. During his remarks, he gave a short sketch of the lives of the six soldiers who are buried in the cemetery, three of whom died in the service, one - Mr. Simon Huntington - of wounds. After the address a procession of carriages was formed, which proceeded to the cemetery. The ladies of the Island had brought their choicest flowers, forming beautiful wreaths and bouquets, and the graves of the unforgotten brave were profusely and beautifully decorated. The grave of one soldier is unmarked by any tombstone, and a committee was appointed, consisting of John T. Woodford and Mrs. George C. Huntington to procure funds for the purpose of erecting a suitable monument over his grave. It is perhaps unnecessary to say that the funds will soon be forthcoming from the large hearted people of the Island.

The ceremonies concluded by singing 'America,' and a benediction by Mr. Holbreck [Holbrook]. The whole proceedings were characterized by a deep solemnity, and at times were truly affecting.

Decoration Day was officially proclaimed on May 5, 1868 and was first observed on May 30 of that year when flowers were placed on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery. Now known as Memorial Day, it is a day of remembrance of those who have died in our nation's service. This day of honor has diminished in scope over the years. Once an island-wide observance with parades, dinners, dancing, boat trips, and speeches, the celebration often started in the morning and ended with fireworks well into the night. Now the honored dead are remembered in quiet but well attended ceremonies at the cemetery organized by VFW Post 9908. The more entertaining festivities have been shifted to the annual Islandfest and Homecoming celebrations.

In 2020, it was discovered that Simon Huntington, the first Island soldier to die during the Civil War (the Battle of Stones River), did not have a GAR (Grand Army of the Republic) star or flag. Leslie secured one and had it installed. Now Simon's death is remembered along with others who gave their lives. Simon Huntington was the Island's first, but not last, casualty of the War.


