From the Mayor's Desk

I am glad to be writing this letter as we will now have another newspaper in town to spread island news. So, spring has sprung and here we are, ready for another year. Winter was quiet, as it should be, and the weather pretty much followed suit. Other than the Christmas Eve storm, the temperatures were moderate for January and February and very little snow. The issue with that is there was no ice for fishing and we all look forward to some ice fishing.

As for village news, we have been busy getting ready for the projects that are scheduled for this year. Here is my village update from back in February, which explains the projects happening this summer, it also can be seen on our village website.

We have been busy taking care of the everyday business to keep the village running and here are some of the items we have been working on.

Safety Forces: The Police Department, for those that did not realize, in October we swore in a new chief, Jamie Bartus and he will be here full-time. Also, we hired a full-time officer, Amy Krall. Both are great additions to our police department and the cost to the village will be minimal.

The Fire Department is having an assessment completed for the village's needs. This assessment will bring to light the possible needs for additional equipment and how to pay for that. Since our community is growing, the thought of a professional opinion was deemed necessary.

Our Emergency Medical System is continuing to excel since joining with Metro

Health a little over two years ago.

Continued training along with the purchasing new equipment with the guidance of Metro Health has greatly enhanced our EMS, which is a benefit to all of us.

Water Department: After all the changes last summer and fall, | am pleased to say Tom Lange is doing an excellent job, along with his new hires. Looks like Huntington will be getting a new waterline in spring, much needed after many years of continuous water leaks. Tom, along with our Village Administrator, Steve Wermuth have been working together, along with RCAP, a federally funded consulting firm with no cost to the village for an EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) low interest loan, towards getting this problem resolved.

Streets and Sidewalks: Happening this spring, Fairview Lane, Lakeview, Crestline, and Lake Ct. will be Tar and Chipped.

Other projects have been talked about but are not on any schedule. Also, Huntington will be paved upon completion of the waterline project. Last fall we were awarded \$400,000.00 from the state's Capitol Budget Fund for the East Lakeshore Project and are working with Bramhall Engineering to prepare the bid specs.

Land and Buildings: In January, The Erie County Health Department opened their new office at the remodeled Golias House on Addison Street. They moved from school and will see patients here. Watch for information dealing with scheduling of a doctor, and dentist, and other health related issues. We

Vicky and Jerry's family home is in Chagrin Falls and they hope to become active participants in our community for years to come. Please extend a warm welcome to them.





Carmen Smith is the Kelleys Island Historical Association's new collections manager. Carmen has been coming to the island her whole life. Two years ago, Carmen moved to the island full time and now is a 'year rounder.'

As the museum's collections manager, Carmen is responsible for inventorying, cleaning and maintaining the museum's artifacts.



The job also includes displaying the museum's artifacts, creating new exhibits, and meeting with people who want to see specific items in the collection

As our new collections manager, Carmen has had a lot to work on. Carmen first had to familiarize herself with the collection, do research on restoration practices, review and add to the on-line catalogue, and sort through the physical collection. Carmen has been able to build on Leslie Korenko's fantastic work as our previous Collections manager, among other positions she held at the museum. Leslie is also a local historian.



This past winter, Carmen completed a general cleaning of the collection. Anything that looked drab or dirty was cleaned and dusted. Next was restoring some of the most fragile or damaged items, like leather, quilts, clothing, and linens in the collection. With the quilts, the first step was vacuuming the dust out of the quilts, a slow and tedious task. Then cotton panels were stitched on the back of each quilt. When the quilts are hung for display, the cotton panel on the back protects the quilt.

With several pieces of clothing, some small repairs were made by patching and darning. A silk wedding

dress required more TLC. The dust is vacuumed out with a special tool called a 'dust table.' Since you can't sew into silk because it is too fragile, netting was tacked over any tears in the material to prevent more damage.

Leather items also required special care. A pair of WW I boots had mold on the outside of the boots and spider nests in the crevices of the boots. They were first cleaned with distilled water. Then Carmen applied an organic leather protectant to prevent more damage. A gorgeous saddle was also cleaned with distilled water and moved to a new location where the saddle straps could hang correctly. This prevents any further damage to the straps from creases.

In terms of new exhibits, Carmen wants to focus on displays that highlight the connection of our artifacts to the island and Lake Erie. Carmen also wants to encourage our museum members to suggest exhibits that might be meaningful for them.



There are two new exhibits this year. One exhibit is geared towards kids. The display, entitled 'From Home to School' focuses on children on the island over the years, showing them playing, camping, and exploring. Children's toys are purposely displayed at their eye level.

The second exhibit is at the entrance to the museum. There Carmen, with help from volunteers Jackie Polofka and John Michael Bankhead, as well as Abbey Rosado, Rostislav Zettler, and Gbenga Banjoko, over the winter constructed a dock. On the wall, there is a historic picture of Kelleys Island ferry riders. Visitors can step up onto the dock and take a photograph!

Visitors may also notice that the


Visitors may also notice that the information about Kelleys Island ferries will be displayed differently and there will be additional information about the different ferries that served the island over the years.

Future plans for the museum include more interactive exhibits that engage the audience. Carmen wants to create a special exhibition space in the northwest corner of the museum that will change every year to keep the museum displays fresh and new. Carmen also wants to create a timeline about island industries, including over the last 20 years, that she plans to mount on the south wall of the

Kelleys Island Audubon Club Celebrates 30 Years

In 1992 a small group of Kelleys Island residents formed the Kelleys Island Audubon Club (KIAC) to protect, preserve and develop natural habitat for the birds and wildlife that inhabit the island. The KIAC was led by President Pat Hayes and Program Chair Lori Hayes, who continue in those capacities to this day. Original board members Jean Kuyoth and June Campbell continue to serve respectively as the Treasurer and Secretary for the club, as they have since the inception. The board has expanded in more recent years to include others who work in various capacities to support and improve the natural areas on the island, including the KI Schools Field Station, the KI State Park, and the KI Village Park Board as well as interested community members.

Most people familiar with the

KIAC associate it with the bird banding studies conducted by Tom and Paula Bartlett. The banding station, located on Cleveland Museum of Natural History property on Long Point, has become a favorite place for local residents and visitors to gather during the spring and fall passerine migration, when warblers, buntings, woodpeckers, and various songbirds land on Kelleys Island to rest and eat as they head either north or south to their seasonal homes. Those people lucky enough to be on the island on late fall evenings can also observe Tom and Paula as they band tiny Northern Saw-whet Owls at the Scheele and North Pond Preserves.

Less known, however, is the impact the KIAC has made in the preservation of various natural areas on the island, including the North Pond, the Scheele Preserve, the Huntley-Beatty Preserve and the Ed

Curilla Preserve. Working closely with the Western Reserve Land Conservancy and the Cleveland Museum of Natural History, President Pat Hayes and the KIAC have helped to identify unique plant species, such as the lakeside daisy, or habitats to facilitate setting aside these important areas to be enjoyed by people and animals alike. With the addition of these natural areas as well as the extensive natural areas owned and maintained by the KI State Park, visitors to the island can spend hours enjoying the beauty of the island and Lake Erie as well as support island businesses and restaurants.

The KIAC meets monthly from May through October on the 3rd Thursday of the month to provide a social gathering for its members. A speaker is featured each month for an educational program. Please consider joining us for our meetings and



Owl Banding Research Fall 2022

2022 owl banding research began in October. After a record year in 2020 with 174 Northern Saw-whet Owls banded and having 5 foreign recaptures and also 126 NSWO banded and three foreign recaptures in 2021, we didn't expect 2022 to be a very good year. The general feeling is that saw-whets follow a four-year cycle, peaking every four years, then crashing before peaking again. 2020 was a peak year but we didn't see the expected crash in 2021 so we were expecting in 2022. That didn't happen, again! Our final count was 134 Northern Saw-whet Owls and 7 Eastern Screech-Owls banded with four foreign recaptures.

The fall owl banding began at the Scheele Preserve, Kelleys Island State Park - North Loop, and North Pond State Nature Preserve on October 13 and continued through December 17. We attempted to band owls on 41 nights (16 nights in October, 17 nights in November, and 8 nights in December). The continued addition of nets at the North Pond SNP trail and along the North Loop trail at the state park again proved to be very productive.

We recaptured four foreign banded Northern Saw-whet Owls and had seven of our banded saw-whets recaptured elsewhere this fall. St. Ignace, Michigan recaptured three of our owls; one from 2019, one from 2020, and one from 2021. One of our owls was recaptured at Sandy Hook, New Jersey. Another was recaptured on Pelee Island, Ontario. Another at Long Point Bird Observatory near Port Rowan, Ontario. And our oldest saw-whet was recaptured in Vinton County, Ohio on November 14. We had banded it on October 24, 2018. In addition, we received word of a

recapture from October 21, 2021 near Brooktondale, New York which we had banded October 13, 2020. There was also a recovery of a dead Eastern Screech-Owl at the Kelleys Island State Park on October 15. We had banded this owl on November 11, 2020 at the State Park. But our best recapture of the year was of an Eastern Screech-Owl on our first night, October 13. She carried band number 0745-90840 and it was a lock-on band which I haven't used in 10 years. She was banded on March 5, 2012 as an AHY-F so she is a minimum of 11 years old!

The fall 2022 migration of saw-whets was expected to be below normal due to the normal Northern Saw-whet Owl cycle. But for much of the country it was a normal fall movement. But again Kelleys Island was not. In Ohio, 326 saw-whets were banded during the fall of 2022 at 7 banding locations. A couple of other Ohio stations also had higher than expected numbers. 2023 season will be interesting. Our age and sex ratio this year was what would normally be expected during a down year. Most years after a crash 80% of our captured owls are young and 20% are adults. In 2021, 60% were hatch-year, 30% were second-year, and 10% were after-hatch year or after-second year. The sex ratios were 66% female, 9% male, and 25% undetermined. This year (2022), 77% were hatch-year birds, 10% were second-year birds, and 13% were after-hatch year or after-second vear birds. This was more typical of a year following a down year. 86% of our birds were females, 4.5% were males, and 9.5% were unknown sex.

We are looking into putting radio tags on some of the owls in the future. The island has a MOTUS tower at the State Park which is designed to pick up signals from the tags and it would give us a better idea of the owls staying and for how long. We have secured funds to purchase nanotags thanks to an islander, Karen Hoy. We are now working on the permits and training to get it started in 2023 or

Our tenth annual Kelleys Island Owl Festival with the Kelleys Island Audubon Club and the Kelleys Island Field Station was over the weekend of November 4-6, 2022. More than 360 people showed up to view the banding and listen to talks. Dr. Blake Mathys, Ohio Dominican University and an owl bander was the featured speaker. His talk was on the his Center Ohio Owl Project. We banded 8 Northern Sawwhets over the three nights. In addition we recaptured two Northern Saw-whets and one Eastern Screech-Owl. The 11th Annual Kelleys Island Owl Festival is schedule for November 3-5, 2023.

Again this year we had some big nights but nothing like November 3 and 4,

2021when we captured 75 owls in the two nights. This vear October 28 and 29 resulted in the capture of 32 owls. November 21 we banded 15 owls. Then, quite unexpectedly on December 11, we captured 10 owls. I have always said, if you want to see saw-whet owls, come to Kellevs island the last week of October or 1st of November. December, you never know...

Don't Fall For The Publisher's Clearing House Sweepstakes Scam

The Publisher's Clearinghouse Sweepstakes has been around since I was a child, and I'm 61 years old.

I remember the TV commercials of the Prize Patrol showing up with balloons and a giant check. A milliondollar prize was awarded to the lucky recipient. This sweepstakes award is well-known, which is having some unfortunate consequences for many who are in my peer group of 60+.

Scammers are impersonating themselves as one who works for Publisher's Clearing House Sweepstakes and calling the 60+population. The message is the senior citizen is a winner of a car and a million dollars. The Publisher Clearinghouse Sweepstakes scam has been around for years. Yet many retirees are not aware. They are only aware of the real Publisher Clearinghouse Sweepstakes.

This scam is so pervasive that the real Publisher's Clearinghouse has established a customer service phone number to warn victims who receive such calls. This phone number is 1-800-392-4190. When called, an automated message will say: "Thank you for calling Publisher Clearinghouse. We would love to make you a winner. And remember, at Publishers Clearinghouse the winning is always free."

Then the automated message asks the caller, "Are you calling because you received a fraudulent contact from someone claiming to be from Publisher's Clearinghouse? Please say Yes or No."

If you say "Yes," the message will respond with, "Please tell us more." If an imposter using the Publisher Clearinghouse name tried to scam you in some way, say the word "scam."

After the caller speaks the word, "scam," the message says, "If you were contacted about a prize award from someone claiming to be from Publisher Clearinghouse, please do not send any money. You have not heard from the real Publishers Clearinghouse. You have received a fraudulent contact. Publishers Clearinghouse would never ask you to send or wire money, pay taxes or fees or any amount to claim a sweepstakes prize. Do not respond to any such contact. If you have been a victim of a scam, we recommend that you file a police report with your local authorities."

The unsuspecting, who are naïve to this crime, are duped into paying the scammer something. There is always a reason/excuse the prize can't be

delivered as intended and requires one more payment. It is common for the payment to be in the form of gift cards. Serving Our Seniors also knows of other older victims who have paid through electronic bank transfers, cash, check, cashier's checks and money orders.

If you have received a call stating that you have won a prize — any prize — the prize will be sent with no strings attached. It will cost you nothing. The prize will arrive on the day the prize was scheduled to arrive and there will be no delays.

If you are an Erie County resident and receiving such calls that you are a winner, call Serving Our Seniors. We will give you the help and moral support you need to report this fraud to local enforcement, the Ohio Attorney General's Office and the Federal Trade Commission.

Erie County residents, ages 60 and older, can call Serving Our Seniors and ask to speak with a senior advocate assistant at 419-624-1856. If you receive such a call after 4:30 pm during the week or on the weekend, the Erie County Financial Elder Abuse Investigator, Dan McLaughlin, wants you to call him 419-503-5385. His passion is preventing this crime from victimizing older adults.

Q: I'm 72 and live on Kelleys Island. I need a ride to the Cleveland Clinic to see a specialist. Can Serving Our Seniors help me?

A: Yes! The more notice we have in advance of your appointment the more likely we are to get you a ride. Serving Our Seniors has 24 volunteers willing to drive at least one time per month. Other volunteers are willing to drive more often. The cost of the ride is an anonymous donation. You will be picked up in Mablehead at the Kelleys Island Ferry Service parking lot, in a Serving Our Seniors car. Or, if you prefer, the volunteer will pick you up at the Port Clinton airport.

Charles D. Burns



(Sept., 1947-Feb. 2023) passed into eternal rest at Mercy Clermont Hospital in Batavia, Ohio, after increasing health challenges during his residence at the Ohio Veterans Home in Georgetown, Ohio.

Born in Sharon, Pa., in Sept. 1947, Charlie (aka "Chuck") retired from the Ohio Bureau of Workers Comp after a career of counseling and advocating for individuals with disabilities to be re-employed with accommodations necessary for their job performance. A career he was drawn into after his own disabling experience: Charlie made medical history for surviving two cerebral aneurysms shortly after honorable discharge from the US Navy in San Diego, in 1971.

Clemens Rotary Club. Bob loved

Charlie had served as a Stores Keeper aboard the SS Perry and SS Annapolis in South East Asia during the Vietnam War, setting up a supply store for troops in the Mekong Delta. But neither medical nor rehab staff knew what to do for a profoundly paralyzed 21-yr. old veteran who couldn't walk, see well, or even grasp how his life had suddenly changed: no more boating, skiing, or driving. Up till then, someone like Charlie at that moment simply died.

Returning to Pennsylvania to live with his parents, Charlie was determined not to spend the rest of his adult life watching daytime tv. When the Ohio Bureau of Employment Services had a new job for a Veterans Re-employment Specialist, Charlie re-entered the workforce, circa 1980. As community services began to

address the "Nam vets," Charlie was asked to chair a support group. His sense of humor and social skills, balanced by his profound physical disability, impacted the group persona, calming distrust, anger, and other facades "the guys" used to suppress their pain and horror.

In 1982, Charlie met and "courted" me, director of the new battered women's shelter home on leave from teaching in Australia but having to return. We married, surrounded by Charlie's "guys", and he joined me down under. In New South Wales, Charlie helped write protocols for employing people with disabilities, and when we returned to the US, he continued a career in counseling injured or disabled workers to return to the workforce, identifying and advocating for "reasonable accommodation" in Cleveland, Dover (Delaware), and Toledo, Ohio. His wit, good humor, and people skills kept him buoyant even as his disabilities created increased challenges as he aged.

Retiring to Kelleys Island in Lake Erie, Charlie continued serving others: he was elected to the school board, served as an officer in the VFW, and on Zion UMC church council. He managed to drive a golf cart, and a pontoon on the bay—driving being what he most missed. We traveled by train, on cruises, and flights: to Nova Scotia, San Diego, Florida, San Antonio, Colorado, Alaska, Vancouver and Washington State, as well as Canada, Wales, and England.


Wherever he went, Charlie made friends. His life was a remarkable journey: unforeseen challenges, unimaginable accomplishments. Around the world, he impacted others' lives, serving in ways he hadn't planned to do, and loved by people in places he didn't expect to go.. 



A History Of Island Newspapers

We welcome the new newspaper Life on Kelleys--The Emerald Isle News which follows in the footsteps of the long-running Kelleys Life. Did you know that Kelleys Island has an incredibly rich history of newspapers going back to the 1860s?

THE ISLANDER 1860-1877 - The Islander is the newspaper that started it all. It was published for a remarkable 17 years, during each winter. The Islander contained from 40 to 80 pages in each weekly issue. Only two issues are missing from the collection. Almost all the content of this newspaper has been transcribed and can be found within the pages of Leslie's history books. The masthead of nearly every issue proclaimed "Independent in all things Neutral in none." And with good reason. Inside these hand-written pages are wonderful stories about life on the Island, local events, world news, handy hints, family histories; pretty much everything you would see in a regular newspaper. The editors changed every week, so there was a variety of opinions and stories presented. Submissions of essays, stories and observations were encouraged. This resulted in a wonderful selection of articles from school children and young and old women and men. The newspapers were read at the weekly Lyceum, held in Kelley's Hall every Saturday evening and 2-300 people would show up. One of the highlights was the reading of essays and the resulting debates. These debates, like on the issue of voting rights for women, were insightful, often humorous and occasionally just a little insulting; but always fairly reported.

It would be almost 50 years before another Island newspaper would be published. For many years it was the Island school that reported the news. THE ERIE ECHO – 1924-1931 was a school newspaper published by The News in Vermilion. It was produced by the high school seniors of each school in Erie County Ohio. THE KI-HI NEWS – 1936-1937 published by the Kelleys Island School and full of interesting news about the students and the community. THE ISLANDER II - 1937-1938 contained a wealth of information and stories about people who lived on the Island almost 100 years ago! THE KELLEGIAN - 1950-1951 continued the school legacy. Most people are familiar with THE SCHOOL SPIRIT - 1963-1965, published by the students of the Kelleys Island school under the direction of Kurt Boker. Part of each paper was devoted to school news, community news, and, thanks to Kurt, a lot of Island history.

In the late 1970s, Carol Elfers began publishing the KELLEYS ISLAND HOME TOWN NEWS 1978-1983. She wrote "Just when you thought you had lost all ties with the island for the winter, along comes a new publication which is designed to help you fight off the winter doldrums - The Kelleys Island Home Town News. A Bridge to the Past." The paper was filled with photos, stories, and island news, and grew as the years went by. Then came SEASCAPE 1989-1991 published by Carole Krzynowek full of local news, and featuring columns by Jessie Martin on Island history and Coradine Myers. In the May 1991 a new KI based publication came out, THE PERCHIE PRESS 1991-1993, publishers Tim & Vicki Sullivan. Covering the World from Kelleys Island, Ohio,' this newspaper focused on antics and news from the Village Council and reports on the new Zoning Code that was being proposed. 'Give 'em The Perch – Give the Gift that Keeps On Irritating.' Political,

embarrassingly observant, it pulled no punches. In later issues, it focused more on Island news. The ISLAND SCENE jumped in to fill the news gap on the Island, publishing its first issue in September 1993 and ending in 1995; Éditor – Phyllis Pahler. Generally 1-2 pages it contained Island news, shying away from politics, unlike its predecessor. When the Island Scene folded, articles began appearing in the PUT-IN-BAY GAZETTE. Each monthly column covered unusual weather, events, council meetings, and news from the community. Finally, rivaling the Islander in longevity came KELLEYS LIFE 1999-2022. It was the Island's first real newsprint newspaper. Regular features included From the Mayor's Desk, EMS/Fire/Safety Services, events, a history column, Chamber and Audubon columns, articles submitted by Islanders, and much more.

Now we have LIFE ON KELLEYS --The Emerald Isle News, a summer newspaper which made its debut with this issue. We welcome this new newspaper, a great addition to a long line of Island newspapers and thank Jerry and Vicky Rovder for making this happen.

Lake Erie Continues Historic Run Of Excellent Fishing

COLUMBUS, Ohio – Lake Erie anglers can expect the 2023 fishing season to provide more world-class fishing and lasting memories, according to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) Division of Wildlife.

Lake Erie walleye fishing will once again be exceptional in 2023. After another year of strong walleye hatches, Lake Erie maintains its title as the Walleye Capital of the World. Additionally, a stable yellow perch population in Lake Erie's west zone will provide good fishing in 2023, while low catch rates are expected to continue in the central and east

"Lake Erie is known worldwide as a top fishing destination," said Travis Hartman, Lake Erie Fisheries Program Administrator for the Division of Wildlife. "With many species to pursue, Lake Erie is again a highperforming destination thanks to science-based management which guides regulations to ensure longterm angling opportunities."

Lake Erie walleye and yellow perch fisheries are managed through an interagency quota system. Each jurisdiction regulates its catches to comply with annually determined

safe harvest levels that ensure sustainability. The most recent quotas were announced on Thursday, March

Walleye

The walleye daily limit on Lake Erie is six fish per angler with a 15-inch minimum length requirement. Walleye hatch success has been exceptional for seven of the past nine years. Anglers will mostly catch abundant 2- to 5-year-old-fish ranging from 15 to 24 inches. Larger fish from 2015 and earlier hatches will provide chances to reel in a Fish Ohio qualifying walleye (minimum 28 inches).

Abundant young fish will show up in the catch and range from 9 to 14 inches, with an increasing number of 2-year-olds reaching 15 inches as the season progresses. Anglers are encouraged to release these sub-legal fish with as little handling as possible so they can contribute to the future fishery.

"Our staff were pleasantly surprised to see the results of the 2022 walleye hatch index," said Travis Hartman, Lake Erie Fisheries Program Administrator for the Division of Wildlife. "After another

year of above-average results, we expect walleye anglers to find more high-performing fishing across the lake"

Yellow perch

Yellow perch abundance in the west zone from Toledo to Huron is increasing as a large year class of 2-year-old fish will join the population in 2023. The best success is anticipated during July through mid-August when the water temperature is above 76 degrees, and again from mid-October through November as adult perch move to shallower water to feed at water temperatures below 60 degrees. These two time periods provided a majority of angler yellow perch harvest in 2022. Abundant young perch from 7 to 9 inches will dominate the catch, with jumbo 12-inch and larger fish from older year classes also contributing to the

The Lake Erie Committee sets conservative quotas each year to ensure sustainable spawning stocks that will allow the best opportunity for population recovery. Yellow perch daily limits remain as described in the 2023-24 fishing regulations through April 30, 2024, with a daily limit of 30 perch in the west zone, 10

in the central zone, and 30 in the east zone.

Bass

Smallmouth bass and largemouth bass fishing in 2023 will remain good with the opportunity for trophy catches. The daily limit is five bass per day, with a 14-inch minimum size requirement until Sunday, April 30, 2023, and again from June 24, 2023, to April 30, 2024. During the spawning season, from May 1 to June 23, 2023, anglers may harvest one bass per day with a minimum size requirement of 18 inches.

Lake Erie fishing reports, information on Lake Erie research and management programs, fisheries resources, maps, and links to other Lake Erie web resources are available at wildohio.gov. The current fishing regulations can be found on the HuntFish OH app, at wildohio.gov, or locations where fishing licenses are sold.

Be prepared with a boat safety kit

You can't always predict an emergency, so be prepared for any situation. Your boat safety kit should be kept on board no matter the size of your boat. Below are some essential items your safety kit should include.

Flashlight – A flashlight and extra batteries can help you see around your boat in the dark

Duct tape – Spring a leak? Temporarily bandage the hole with duct tape. First aid kit – A properly equipped first aid kit, plus the knowledge on how to use it, is vital in case of an accident or medical emergency.

Whistle – As a recognized signal calling for help on the water, a waterproof whistle is another must-have.

Ropes – These are critical for pulling someone in who has fallen overboard, securing your craft to the dock and tying down loose items in extreme weather.

Mirror – A mirror or any reflective object can signal for help.

Garbage bags – Use them as rain ponchos and protection for items on board.

Fire extinguisher – All passengers should know the location of your fire extinguisher and how to use it.

Life jackets – You should have a U.S. Coast Guard approved life jacket for every person on board.


