On Friday, May 16th, Kelleys Island School and Field Station launched its 'Green Devils for the Day' program. We had the pleasure of hosting 100 enthusiastic 8th-grade students from Edison Local Schools. Edison Middle School students arrived on Kelleys Island eager for a day of learning and exploration. Students were treated to an engaging walking tour that highlighted the island's unique geological features, including the glacial grooves, the Alvar, and the historic stone crusher. This provided a wonderful opportunity for them to walk directly on the grooves, discover fascinating fossils, and gain insight into the geological history of Lake Erie.

Following the tour, the students visited the Kelleys Island School and Field Station, where they participated in a hands-on activity examining plankton samples under microscopes allowing students to identify plankton samples and understand their vital role within the Lake Erie food web. Additionally, students received a tour of the school where everyone enjoyed a pleasant lunch together in our newly constructed

The visit was a great success, and the students left with a deeper appreciation for the formation of the Great Lakes, their current importance, and the critical need to protect this valuable resource. We would like to extend our sincere gratitude to

From the Mayor's Desk

If you are not already aware, the Village adopted an ordinance that now requires ALL rental properties to be registered with the village to be legally permitted to operate as a rental on Kelleys Island. The deadline for making application for your license is May 30th, 2025 and if you have not already made application by the deadline you will not be permitted to operate a Short term Rental on the Island.

The program requires a series of steps to become licensed including filling out the application and paying the licensing fee, getting a qualified home inspection completed, getting a septic inspection completed, providing the necessary insurance coverage, and registering with the county for tax compliance. The Kelleys Island Landowners Association (KILA) received four applications to support projects in 2025

and have

Two awards were approved by the board of directors:

1. Kelleys Island School - \$7261.00 for furnishing the outdoor classroom pavilion for the KI Field Station. The seating will include two octagon picnic tables with attached seating to accommodate 16 and four perimeter seating benches that will allow for up to eight people to sit at a comfortable distance if that is their preference. In addition, a trash receptacle will be purchased for the space. The Outdoor Classroom pavilion will be available for KILA and other community groups to use when not engaged by the Field Station.

2. Kelleys Island 4-H Camp -\$2448.00 for the dining hall updates. This includes appliances to better serve campers, staff, and the KI community. The 4-H camp hosts the annual KILA family havride on the third Saturday in October.

The other two applications needed further information in order to act on the requests.

Awards for these and past projects are made possible by KILA members. Over the last five years, KILA has approved support for 12 projects totaling about \$65,000. Annual dues, donations, and fundraising activities are the sources to fund KILA's contributions. Our main fundraising activity is the annual Raffle. Five cash prizes (\$2500, 1000, 500, 250, 100) are given. Raffle tickets are \$20 each and only 600 will be sold. Tickets will be available from KILA board members soon.

"What Can You Do At The

To fully understand what the KIHA is all about, visit The Museum Campus at 224-226 Division Street, Kelleys Island, Ohio 43438. There you will find The KIHA History Museum and Gift Shop (OPEN 12-4 Thursday-Monday), The Old Stone Church, and The Parsonage House and Sis's Cottage Resale Shop (OPEN Dailey 12-4 or by appointment).



The History Museum is artfully curated and begins from ancient times to the present. Interactive displays, along with reading, and photos take you through this interesting timeline. Put on a hat and join the crowds of tourists getting off of a steamer in the 1920s. Read about the animals of the island and see up close and personal the beloved island turkey, named Stanley. Amongst our collections, Children will hunt for our mascot, Tarzan, the talking dog, and receive a prize when Tarzan is found! Young and old alike will find a keepsake or gift at the beautiful Gift Shop!



The Gift Shop displays the handmade quilt that will be raffled off in September. Be sure to buy your Ouilt Raffle Tickets (\$1 each or 6 for \$5) and see the beautiful work done by Islander Theresa "Teri" Betzenheimer Behrends, for the benefit of The Historical Association. Teri has a family history with the Parsonage Home/House. Her Grandparents, Alexander Betzenheimer and Emma (Beatty) Betzenheimer rented the Parsonage home after the German Reformed Church stopped using it as a Parsonage. Part of the arrangement was that they would take care of the Church, the grounds of the Church, and the Parsonage House.

Teri still does that task today. She is the gardener you see keeping things nice on the Museum Campus! Teri has been a KIHA Board Member since being asked to by past president Mike Feyedelem. Teri added in our interview, that she and Mike attended KI elementary school together. She was inspired by her aunt Florence ("Sis") to start making the quilts as a fundraiser after Russ Matso stopped making clocks that were raffled off for fundraising. That was in 1994. Until about 10 years ago, Teri quilted by hand. Now the quilting is done on a friend's long-arm machine. Besides the uniqueness of each design, Teri adds a personal message on the back of each quilt. The

message is related to a milestone family event. This year's quilt was made in 2011. It was donated back to Teri. Be sure to read the inscribed message on the back of this quilt honoring dear family friends. This will most likely be the last queen-sized quilt that she will donate. After 30 years of quilt making Teri will retire. But she says she will continue to use up her material and make smaller items like baby blankets, table runners, and wall hangings. Teri has continued to make an impact and serve the community of Kelleys Island, just like her Grandparents, Parents, Aunts, Uncles, and various cousins have over the years. By serving on the Kelleys Island Historical Association Board and being an ACTIVE member through her gardening and quilting work, Teri has demonstrated the spirit of an Islander. Each and every person on Kelleys Island can donate their time or skills to help this small piece of paradise continue to thrive for future generations. The Kelleys Island Historical Association and the Community of Kelleys Island wish to offer Teri a sincere "Thank You" for her years of service.

The Old Stone Church was built in 1866 and was originally used as The German Reformed Church. It was vacated in 1956 and was acquired by KIHA in 1986. The church is open for a self-guided tour, typically when the Museum or Resale Shops are open. The church makes a lovely venue for weddings small or performances or readings. was built in 1888 as the home to the Pastor of The German Reformed Church. Now it helps support KIHA through the sales of donated items. Inside the home, it is easy to see how and where the family lived. Many pieces of the home are in original condition, including the red pump at the kitchen sink. The home never had indoor plumbing and so, the outhouse remains standing in the backyard. Beside the outhouse, is Sis's Cottage, an extension of the Resale Shop. The last occupant of the Parsonage House was Florence (nee Betzenheimer). She was one of five children raised in the home after the church no longer used it as a Parsonage. Florence was known as "Sis" to her family and islanders. She had moved into the home with her two daughters and raised them there. She

Campers on Kelleys

Back in the 1990's Kelleys Island adopted a zoning code that restricted people from openly placing campers on lots for overnight accommodations. There are significant limitations today for the use of campers and due to a recent uptick in the occurrences of campers, we are taking time to be certain people understand the existing laws pertaining to campers and camping.

With the proper permits from the police department, Campers are permitted for up to 30 consecutive days on lots that have homes built on them and the homes can provide the necessary accommodations for cooking and sanitary needs. This provision allows an existing homeowner to permit a guest to show up with a camper for an extended stay not to exceed 30 days and DOES require a permit from the police department.

For property owners who are in the building phase of developing their property, i.e they have the necessary construction permits and are actively engaged in the process of building, these folks are permitted to also get an extended camper/trailer permit for up to one year, provided the camper is plumbed into the lots existing and approved septic system on the lot in question. An additional 6 month permit can be added to the first year in the event the project was not completed in the first 12 months. This is only permitted with the appropriate permit also from the police department.

Campers on empty lots are not permitted under any circumstances. Campers on property without a habitable structure are not permitted under any circumstances. Campers in business parking lots are not permitted. Overnight campers are not permitted parked in public parking spaces.

The storage of campers on lots with homes are permitted provided they are not stored in setback areas of the respective zoning code and they are not hooked up to utilities and being used for overnight accommodations without the

necessary permits.

The specific details related to Camping on Kelleys are spelled out clearly in the ordinance book in chapter 96. Additionally, 96.99 deals specifically with the violations related to not having the necessary permits and it states. "Any person violating any provision of this chapter is guilty of a minor misdemeanor and shall, upon conviction, be fined in a sum not exceeding \$150. Each day in violation of any provision of this chapter shall constitute a separate offense. Upon conviction of a second violation within a six-month period, such person shall be guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree."

Council Notes

Leslie Korenko

The Police Dept reported that new tech will be installed soon and evidence tracking program will be in place soon. EMS reported 3 runs and 3 clinic calls. Monthly training continues. Council authorized the creation of part-time paramedics particularly to help during the summer months. The Fire Dept. had one run. A study of future needs was withcompleted recommendations. Several have already been implemented. The biggest issue is a new Fire Dept. building, which has been on the wish list for several years; however, no location has been selected. Other recommendations include training; Standard Operations Procedures Manual; updating trucks and equipment; creating a hazardous site plan (trails, quarries, etc); and secure State funding. In addition, the Fire Dept. will be working with the Water Dept to identify alternative water supplies for fighting fires (those that don't use the municipal water system which has volume limitations). The OEPA has completed its review of the Water Dept, and found no violations. There have been several queries about co-locating on private towers, but nothing formal has been submitted. Any towers must comply

with Village Code section 152.045 which identifies just two locations for towers. New towers outside these areas would require a change in the Zoning Code. The Ordinance increasing the salary of the Zoning Inspector passed. It was clarified that the increase was due to the additional duties relating to administering the Transient Rental Program. Deadline for registration for this program was May 30. Planning Commission met and will be recommending some changes to the Zoning Code to clarify and streamline several sections. Many of these have been in place since 1993.



The Double-Crested Cormorant: A Master of Water and Air

The double-crested cormorant is one of North America's most widespread and adaptable waterbirds. Recognizable by its sleek black body, orange-yellow facial skin, and – during the breeding season – tufts of black or white feathers above each eye (its "double crests"), this striking bird has long fascinated birdwatchers, ecologists, and fishermen alike. With its remarkable diving abilities and controversial status in some communities, the double-crested cormorant is a species worth knowing.

Adult double-crested cormorants measure about 30 to 35 inches in length with a wingspan that can exceed four feet. They are often mistaken for ducks or geese from a distance, but closer inspection reveals a slimmer, more angular silhouette and a distinctive hooked bill. Their webbed feet and powerful legs make them

excellent swimmers, but unlike ducks, their feathers are not fully waterproof. This trait allows them to dive efficiently but also means they must dry their wings after fishing – a behavior famously captured in photos of cormorants perched with wings outstretched.

Double-crested cormorants are expert fishers. They dive underwater using their strong legs to propel themselves and can remain submerged for over a minute. Their diet includes a wide variety of fish species, and they have been observed to adapt their feeding habits depending on local fish populations.

Once in decline due to pesticide contamination and habitat loss, the double-crested cormorant population rebounded following environmental protections enacted in the mid-20th century. Today, cormorants can be seen around KI in large flocks. Many thousand cormorants can be viewed

during a boat trip around Middle Island.

In some areas, cormorants are viewed as a threat to fish stocks and aquaculture operations. This has led to management programs that include egg oiling, nest destruction, and in some cases, culling.

Despite the controversies, double-crested cormorants play an important ecological role. As top predators in aquatic food webs, they help regulate fish populations and serve as indicators of environmental health. Their nesting colonies also contribute nutrients to ecosystems, though in high concentrations, their guano can impact vegetation and soil chemistry.


The double-crested cormorant is a resilient, intelligent, and efficient bird that has successfully adapted to both natural and human-altered environments. While its growing population presents challenges in certain regions, it also offers opportunities to rethink how we manage wildlife in a changing world. Understanding and appreciating the

complexity of species like the doublecrested cormorant is key to fostering coexistence between people and the natural ecosystems we share.

If you're new to bird watching, you're not alone! Birding has evolved from a niche hobby into a global pastime enjoyed by millions. Part of the appeal is tied to increased awareness of environmental issues and a desire to connect with nature. Technological advancementshave helped fuel interest in the hobby. In the birdwatching required specialized knowledge and bulky field guides. While field guides are still essential, online platforms and apps like eBird, iNaturalist and Merlin help birders both new and old identify and track birds. They also help foster a sense of community among birders of all skill levels. Joining organizations like KIAC can also fuel knowledge and interest. There's always so much to see on Kelleys Island!

Comparing the First Half of 2025 to Last Year

It is always interesting to see how the market shifts from year to year, and 2025 has taken on a slightly different rhythm here on Kelleys Island.

We are five months into the year, and so far, the number of single-family homes sold matches 2024 at five. However, there are a couple of key differences. This year, homes are taking a little longer to sell, averaging around 120 days compared to 98 last year at this time. While prices are a bit higher this year, averaging around \$599,000 compared to \$509,000 last year, the gap between list price and sale price has widened in some cases. A few homes have closed at 83 to 86 percent of their original asking price,

and the overall 2025 sale-to-list ratio for homes sits at about 92 percent. That reflects a more cautious, value-focused and price-sensitive group of buyers.

Only one condo has sold this year, compared to two during the same period in 2024. That said, the price stayed right in the same ballpark at just over \$420,000, which shows that demand is still there if the property is positioned well.

The land market has been a bit slower too. We have had two lot sales in 2025 so far, with average prices coming in a bit lower than last year. To be fair, 2024 included a large five-acre parcel that sold for \$350,000, which pushed the 2024 averages up. This year's land buyers have focused on

smaller, buildable lots in the \$60,000 to \$170,000 range. A few are under contract now, and I would not be surprised to see more activity as summer kicks into gear.

Overall, the market remains healthy. Buyers are looking carefully, taking their time, and placing offers that reflect what they see in value. That is not a bad thing. It simply means both buyers and sellers need to come into the market informed and prepared.

If you're thinking about buying, selling, or just keeping an eye on the market, I'm always happy to talk it through. Real estate on Kelleys Island isn't just about numbers, it's about timing, community, and finding the right fit for your plans and lifestyle.



Kelleys Island Septic Systems 2025

The Village of Kelleys Island has no municipal sewage treatment facility. All sewage on the island is treated in home sewage treatment systems (HSTS) or commercial package plants/small flow systems. Some systems on the island are new and some are old. The age of the system does not always determine when or if a system will fail. Numerous problems can occur with any septic system. Some of the problems are caused by human error and others are caused by Mother Nature.

Some of the signs that your system may be failing included the following:

- Sewage has begun to back up into the house or into the septic tank causing it to overflow or drain slowly
- Odors of raw sewage are noticed outside or inside the residence
- The soil on or around the septic system has become soft and "spongy" from moisture. This area can usually be identified with lush green grass.
- Well water can become contaminated with bacteria

If any of the signs listed above are observed, they should be further investigated. If one of these signs is detected it may be for other reasons besides a failing household sewage system. Sometimes these issues above can be simple repairs instead of a costly replacement of the entire septic system.

Household sewage systems can fail because of human errors such as the overuse of the septic system. It is not uncommon for homes to be designed as a two-bedroom home and later converted to a three- or four-bedroom home. This new addition can increase the amount of water flow put into the system and can cause pre-mature failures. Sometimes Mother Nature can play a role in the failure of a system. If a system becomes oversaturated with groundwater it can cause sewage to rise and break through the surface of the ground. Tree roots can also cause system problems. The roots can cause blockages in pipes leading to a backup of sewage into the home or septic tank.

Tips to prolong the life of your system:

• Limit the number of guests/ renters at your home. Over renting/ overuse of any septic system will lead to pre-mature failure as systems are designed based on the number of bedrooms in a home. Bedrooms are a key indicator of the occupancy of a structure and the wastewater to be generated.

- Conserve as much water as possible by using low flow fixtures, taking shorter showers, check fixtures for any leaks, and only run full loads of laundry.
- Never dispose of paper towels, plastics, tissues, greases/oil, paint, feminine hygiene products, or "flushable wipes" into your septic system.
- Make sure downspouts and groundwater sump pumps are not discharging into the septic tank and divert downspouts and groundwater sump pump discharges away from the septic system; especially the secondary system (leach bed, mound, etc.).
- Have your septic tank routinely pumped (one every 3-5 years) and have tank lids brought to grade for easier accessibility. More frequent pumping may be necessary if heavy solids accumulate in the tank and when the system has heavier than normal use for prolonged periods of time.
- Maintain mechanical components if applicable and maintain a service contract with a registered service provider.
- Educate guests, family, friends staying at your homes about your septic system and the tips listed above.
- Be aware of the replacement area on your property. If your current septic system fails, the replacement area is there to accommodate the installation of another system in the future when that time comes. Protect the soil in the replacement area and avoid constructing things such as driveways or buildings on or near the replacement area. Contact the Erie County Health Department if you are not sure where your replacement area is located on your property.

If you suspect that your system may be failing, malfunctioning, or in need of routine service you should contact a registered service provider or registered septage hauler. Connie's life left a legacy of love, laughter, and devotion. She is already greatly missed, her memory will remain alive in the hearts of all who knew her.







"Everyone remembers the grand old monarch that formerly stood near the center of the Island. The pride of the neighborhood, the wonder of visitors, and the trysting place of young people who came in from the county. The following interesting sketch, in memory of the good old tree, is taken from our exchanges.

The Eagle Tree is one of the things past, for it now no longer towers above

its neighbors but lies low upon the ground. We all dreaded to see it go, for it seemed like the relic of the past, standing alone unchangeable, while everything around it changed as the years sped away. A great many have wondered how high the tree was. As it was probably as tall as anything on the Island, it may be interesting to some of you to know how high it was.

It was measured just 84 ft. up to where it was burned off last fall. The part that fell was 20 ft. up to the next, and the limbs were still

higher. The nest therefore was 104 feet from the ground. If you have ever been to the foot of the tree and looked up, you can imagine how high were the walls of Babylon, as they were 100 ft. high.

The nest was a great curiosity to many and for their benefit we will say that when it fell, there was rubbish enough upon the ground to have filled a good sized wagon. Some of the largest sticks of which the nest was made were nearly as large as your wrist and about two ft. long. Some of the smaller ones were longer. The birds must have worked hard and patiently, more so than any of us would have done.

The old eagles had not been to their homes for some time before the fire and woodsman's axe tore it down. They only stopped now and then to rest their weary wings and perhaps to mull upon their once bright and happy home. If such a thing were possible for his lordship to do which is very doubtful."

Eagles built several nests over the years. One nest was a tourist attraction as a map from the 1960's shows. The nest was built in almost the same area as the one mentioned above. Eagles became threatened by pesticides in the food chain and this nest also fell victim to neglect and the elements. In September 1963, the school newspaper, The School Spirit, reported that "one of our Island landmarks is no longer a scenic attraction. The old Eagle Nest near the E. Quarry fell from the tree during a severe storm in June. This nest, however, has not been in use for a number of years. One nest still remains and the Eagles have been around here all summer." That second nest was later abandoned.

Eagles returned to the islands in 2003 and a pair began incubating eggs in a nest on Middle Bass Island. In 2004, 2005 and 2006 a young nesting pair unsuccessfully attempted to breed on

Kelleys Island. However, Islanders were hopeful that a new nest, started in 2008, would be successful for these magnificent birds and in 2009 the first Eagles in over 50 years successfully fledged their offspring from a nest just north of the Seaway Marina. Tom Bartlett does a winter bird count each year and in December 2024, he counted 30 Eagles on the Island, most on Long Point. This is an incredible come back.

Master Gardeners aim to combat food insecurity

A total of four community agencies and area businesses together with three Erie County Master Gardener Volunteers are partnering to provide research-based education and a handson experience that will build confidence in growing food.

Barnes Nursery, Corso's, Care & Share, and OHgo are collectively providing the soil, plants, and students for this pilot project. The target audience are the clients who receive food from these two food banks.

"We are delighted for the Master Garden Volunteers to do a project like this," Anita Kromer of Care & Share said.

Added Joe Ramey of Barnes Nursery: "We thought it would be a great way to give back. It is in our realm and we strongly support it."

Master Gardener Volunteer Gaye Harris-Miles was the inspiration behind the project and is the co-instructor.

"The food bank recipients are enthusiastic to learn, and we hope that this experience will encourage each one to grow more food in the future, and to inspire neighbors, family and friends to learn how to grow food as well," stated Master Garderner Volunteer Kathryn Goerig-Eastlake, co-instructor, and Master Gardener Volunteer David Eastlake assists as

At the sessions, the Master Gardeners are teaching good gardening practices regarding the features of a container garden, and what vegetables can be grown in one. Future sessions will include participants selecting vegetables for their container; and discussions about healthy plant requirements, pest management and backyard wildlife management.

This project will conclude with each student planting their chosen plants in a 5-gallon bucket and taking it home to set on their porch or stoop to manage and finally to eat the produce that their plants will provide. Corso's is donating the plants.

"We love that our participants were given the opportunity to learn how to grow food in their communities and homes, without needing too much space to do it. We believe it will increase vegetable consumption, and has potential to significantly supplement their diets," said Christine Boesch of OHgo.


